

FARMER UNION VOTES SUPPORT TO MAX GEHLHAR

COUNTY GROUP RETAINS CORPS FOR NEW YEAR

Bethel—The Marion county convention of the Farmers' Union met in all day session at the Bethel school Saturday. The Bethel local entertained the convention. It was the largest gathering of Farmer Union members ever held in the county.

Ernest Werner of Central Howell local presided; secretary, W. L. Creech of Bethel local; reporter, Mrs. J. R. Carruthers. The reports of the county locals were given by Mrs. Carruthers, Bethel; R. E. Jones, Brooks; J. W. Gilmore and Mrs. Warren Gray, Marion; Joseph Brent, Mt. Angel; P. J. McGuire, Central Howell; A. R. Coleman, St. Paul.

A. G. Rempel of Dallas reported that Polk county is setting up a Farmers' Union gas and oil station. The morning session adjourned and the women of the Bethel local served dinner at noon. When the afternoon session convened, Miss Weinacht of McKee spoke on the activities and expenditures of the highway department. He presented a resolution which was unanimously adopted and copies to be sent to the Governor and C. K. Spaulding.

WHEREAS, there has been much controversy regarding the reconstruction of the Pacific highway between Salem and Oregon City, and WHEREAS, all telephone poles are being removed from this portion of the highway, thereby giving full sixty feet to the highway.

WHEREAS, it is resolved, that we, the members of the Farmers' Union of Marion county, Oregon, do hereby recommend a thirty-foot pavement on this sixty-foot highway.

It is the opinion of a forty-foot pavement could be placed on the sixty-foot right of way by proper drainage with the use of the open ditch now in use. This would leave ten feet of space on each side to be used for parking or in case of emergency.

Be it further resolved, that we fully endorse Mr. C. K. Spaulding's program of reducing the State engineering force, also the salaries to a point in keeping with the times and the salaries and services of the county employees as outlined by Mr. Spaulding.

Election of officers resulted in the re-election of the present officers. Max Gehlhar, director of the department of agriculture, spoke regarding the administration and the economies effected in the department the first half year.

All the original expenses of the convention have been paid and savings effected to date are over \$17,000. He proposed to put the state fair on a cash basis and to reduce the operating cost for this year \$30,000 and pull the fair out of the hole by drastic salary cuts. His address received unanimous approval and a resolution was drafted to be sent to the governor expressing confidence in Gehlhar and appreciation of his work.

J. J. Sechrist of Ballston, state vice-president of the Farmers' Union spoke on the clover seed situation. He said: "The discrimination against Oregon grown seed has originated entirely from experimental agencies. The evidence has been gathered from plot tests conducted at certain experimental stations. The results vary greatly and are not conclusive enough to warrant the active propaganda those people are circulating."

Sechrist has recently returned from making a survey of conditions in the central states as regards the ban on Oregon clover seed. This seed brings the Oregon grower 9c per pound when the going price is 10c. Proof is available that seed men of Ohio have mixed their noxious seed into Oregon grown clover seed and have sold it for Ohio grown clover seed.

The state convention will be in session in Salem during the last week of May. The committee appointed to take charge are J. J. O'Shea, E. A. Rhoten, Bethel local; George Potts, Marion local; A. R. Coleman, St. Paul local; Ronald Jones, Brooks local; Frank Hittner, Mt. Angel local; Silas Torbuck, Central Howell local.

J. J. O'Shea, national organizer from Montana then spoke, making plans for the coming membership campaign in this state.

A. R. Coleman gave invitation for the county convention of April 2 to be held at St. Paul. Invitation accepted.
