

FARMERS' FIRE RELIEF REPORT MADE FOR YEAR

Stanton—The 35th annual meeting of the Farmers' Fire Relief Association of Sublimity was held with the largest membership in attendance that it ever had since its organization. There were members present from Salem, Woodburn, Mt. Angel, Scio, Dallas, Cottage Grove and Dayton.

The secretary's report shows insurance written during 1931 was \$49,305. On January 1, 1932, there were 1,963 policies in force insuring 2,214 buildings and contents for the amount of \$1,218,349. Receipts for the year were as follows: Premiums from new members, \$1,442.78; assessments paid, \$3,847.82; interest received, \$448.46; total receipts, \$5,739.06; disbursements, 9 fire losses, \$6,159.97; (this was the largest annual fire loss in the history of the association). Total amount paid for fire losses since organization, \$18,851.44; general running expenses for 1931 averaged 77 cents per \$1,000 of insurance in force.

J. M. Schen, chief deputy of the insurance department and Lester B. Davis, state fire marshal gave the assembly a very instructive and interesting discussion on mutual insurance.

DALLAS SCOUT TROOPS OFFER FINE CEREMONY

PETITIONS ARE MAJOR ISSUES BEFORE BOARD

Hubbard—Petitions are the order of the day as was indicated at the school board meeting held at the school Monday evening. One asking the favorable consideration of the former principal, J. R. Hildgo, for the next school year was presented and attached to his application and placed on file with the other applications to the position. Another one was reported to be about ready for circulation, this one taking the opposite view of the first one; a third one, endorsing the action of the board in the election of a principal regardless of whom they choose, is in the office. One school patron approached several times on the project and being assured that there were signatures to each, predicted that the next one which he proposed to draw up asking the consent of the city council to move Mt. Hood to Hubbard, would also find plenty of signatures.

Bidgood was principal of the Hubbard schools for five years, succeeding L. Beyers, who had been in charge of the school from the time of the dissolution of the union district with Woodburn as the central point. Bidgood did not apply for the position for the following school year, saying he had other plans and the board then elected Chester Ward.

Ward was recently elected superintendent of the union high school at Coquille, where he will have in addition the superintendency of the grades with 20 teachers, two principals and some 800 students. His contract there is dated to take effect after the school year closes in Hubbard.

The Hubbard high school now has an attendance of 53 students which is the peak of enrollment for many years. All are residents of the district and only one student in the district attends elsewhere. According to the official inspection by high school officials from Salem the school is again standard.

The board meeting was attended by Garfield Vogel, chairman; A. F. de Lospina, Waldo E. Brown, board members; E. O. Erickson, clerk; H. C. Mack, J. Smolinsky, F. Barrett, Lloyd Hopkins, patrons; Elroy Bates, reporter for Hubbard Enterprise. According to the chairman many applications for the position of superintendent are on file and no immediate action will be taken. The only matter given attention at this time was the cutting of all salaries for teachers and principal, a reduced schedule of salaries being adopted unanimously.
