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NOTT ASSERTS LESS DRINKING IN U. S. TODAY

Dallas—A celebration in honor of the eighteenth amendment was held in the local Evangelical church with the county W. C. T. U. as its sponsors. The gathering was presided over by Mrs. P. T. Carnes and the guest speaker was Earl Nott, district attorney for Yamhill county.

Nott expressed the belief that prohibition is here to stay and that those who are clamoring for the repeal of the act and who assert that the law can not be enforced are the most flagrant violators. Of the law itself he said "it was probably the most fundamental and far reaching moral law that has ever been enacted and that human slavery, deplorable though it was, could not be compared to slavery to drink and drunkenness which existed when saloons flourished in this country."

While admitting that prohibition laws are being broken the speaker asserted that, in this respect they are no different from other laws, and that opponents of the Volstead act could certainly not say that the laws affecting the sale of liquor in the "good old days" were enforced as they should have been especially to minors. In support of this statement he related sights which he had seen at various times on State Street in Salem, drinking was common in these days in Universities but today conditions are exactly reversed. "So rare" said the speaker "are drinking episodes at the colleges to-day that certain
