

WILLAMETTE WINS 2 TILTS FROM MULTNOMAH CLUB

VARSITY SQUAD DOWNS CLUBMEN IN CLOSE GAME

Willamette university basketball teams took both games of a double-header with Multnomah Amateur Athletic club of Portland on the Hearst floor Thursday night. Coach Sparks' intermediate squad won 37 to 36 while the regulars of the local university came from behind to take the line end of a 37 to 35 score from the visitors.

With Andrews and Keenan getting away from their guards Multnomah rolled up a sizeable score before Willamette could get started in the first half which ended 20 to 14 for the clubmen.

Coach Keenan injected some fight into his squad during the intermission and two baskets were garnered in less than a half minute while the score was tied after about 10 minutes of play. From then on the battle was nip and tuck, with Willamette stretching its lead to 24 points at one time. With two minutes to go, Cherry, who went in for Smith when the latter was benched on fouls, dribbled through to bring his team up within two points of the Bearcats.

Referee Maple called a foul on Allen with 8 seconds of play remaining. Multnomah failed to convert and in the scramble for possession of the ball, Benjamin was accused of a misplay. Once more the clubmen failed to connect while Willamette kept possession of the ball until the gun sounded.

Perc Carpenter and Roy Benjamin proved the best shots for the Bearcats. The entire team looked more like a ball club during the second half than at any other time this season.

The Multnomah intermediates, boasting former Portland high school stars, including Applegate and Reimer of the Commerce team of 1930, played on even terms with the Willamette yearlings throughout the contest. The frosh looked much better against the clubmen than against Salem high and played a much faster game.

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SALEM HI HAS FOUR BIG GAMES NEXT 10 DAYS

Coach Hollis Huntington will lead his band of Salem high basketball players to Eugene Friday evening where they will engage the freshman squad of the University of Oregon. It will be the second meeting of the season for the two teams, the first having resulted rather disastrously for the preppers since they were beaten here last Saturday night, 18 to 10. Salem has the memory of a football defeat last fall to spur them on.

Coach John Warner and his never tiring Fishers from Astoria will invade Salem for a two game series January 29 and 30. Astoria came here a few weeks before the state tournament last March and took a 47 to 16 lacing. The same team which took the beating however, went through the tournament to place third, apparently being stronger at the finish than at the start.

DALLAS TOWN TEAM NOT ROUGH, CLAIM

Dallas—The article which appeared on the sporting page of a Salem morning paper relative to the game between Willamette university and the town team has been the cause of considerable comment among the basketball fans of this city. The management and players of the club are also at a loss to know just why they should be classed as being "cocky" and "rough." The players certainly do not have the appearance of being "cheaty" if that is what the writer of the article inferred by the term he used. In order to ascertain if the statement that members of the team were inclined to play rough was correct, a careful check was made of the games played and the number of fouls noted. A total of 11 games have been played by the club of which seven have been won. Nine-four persons have been called against the boys, or an average of 8.5 per game as compared with 91 against their opponents or an average of 8.2. The result of the check-up will be sufficient to convince anyone who follows the game that the Dallas town team plays as clean a brand of ball as any other basketball aggregation.

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Good Trapshooter, Plays Bridge, Has 100 Sweaters Helen Hicks, Golf Queen,

New York, Jan. 22 (AP)—A few years ago when Helen Hicks' father needed a golfing partner, he used to take the young lady along with him for company. Now she takes him out and charitably helps him to polish up his game.

She was 12 then and didn't like golf. Now it dominates her life. She can tell you offhand how many strokes she took on any hole in any tournament during the last five years.

Today she is the national women's golf champion, 20 years old, a stocky, powerful young lady with a booming laugh that has rung out over most of the great courses of the country. She is five feet six inches tall and weighs 140 pounds.

Her game is orthodox, good form all around. She hits magnificent tee shots. Improvement in her approach game brought her into the championship class last year. Glena Collett Vane, six times national champion, and her greatest rival, is one of her best friends. Maureen Orcutt is her jinx, can usually beat her just by tossing a putter on the nearest green.

Helen gets a big thrill out of college football, reads a great deal, likes to fly but doesn't want to learn how, plays basketball with her high school alumni teams and scores most of the points. She drives a big car fast but the motorcycle policemen on Long Island know her and wave her on.

She's a good trapshooter and swimmer and does on contract bridge and backgammon, dancing and sport clothes. She has 100 sweaters. She can't sing and isn't interested in music. She isn't engaged but has one favorite boy friend.

Those who wanted to leave their first year were All-American John Baker and Galus Shaver, guard and quarterback, and Capt. Stan Williamson, center, and Jim Musick, fullback.

Ernie Pinkert, while he was being picked at the halfback berth on numerous All-Americans, wanted to play fullback. Baker, who became an immortal in U. S. C. history when he kicked the field goal that gave his team a last-minute 16 to 14 victory over Notre Dame this season, believed during his freshman year that he never would be able to make the Trojan varsity.

He considered returning to his home at Kingsburg, Calif., and then going the following fall to Idaho, where he believed he could be a regular under Leo Calahan, former U. S. C. star and now coach. Shaver was a substitute his freshman year because he played quarterback and Pinkert, an iron man, was the regular frosh quarter that season. Shaver wished he had gone to some Southern Conference college instead of the University of Southern California.

Capt. Williamson will admit to this day that he was stricken with a very serious attack of old fashioned homesickness his first year at Southern California and that he wanted to quit school and go home to Pittsburg, Calif. He felt then and said often that he never would be able to make the varsity. His fraternity brothers persuaded him to stay on at school.

Musick rounded out his career a hard-hitting 200-pound fullback, but he felt when he first came to the Trojan campus that he should have gone to junior college while he filled out a bit and picked up more weight.

New Orleans, La., Jan. 22 (AP)—A group of gamblers was reputedly approximately \$100,000 richer today by reason of a "build up" coup they staged in the first race at Jefferson park here yesterday.

The "builders" bet on Charm, the favorite quoted at odds of 1 to 2 in the race and then, at post time, wagered approximately \$10,000 on other horses to build up Charm's

odds to pay \$19.60 as winner on a \$2 mutual ticket. Bookmakers over the country were believed by the informed to have lost heavily. In "building" on Charm, once owned by Al Capone, and trained by C. S. Stubbs, the gamblers took a chance as the mare barely got home in front of Finger Tip in the six furlong race.

DEMPSEY WANTS LEVINSKY BOUT

Chicago, Jan. 22 (AP)—Jack Dempsey will make his first appearance in a Chicago ring February 18 for the first time since his famous 14-count battle with Gene Tunney four years ago.

The Manassa mauler was signed today for a four round exhibition in the Chicago stadium with the probability that King Levinsky will be his opponent, provided the Kingfish will accept the financial inducements. Levinsky, with recent victories over Tommy Loughran and Paulino Uzcudun, is the man Dempsey wants to meet.

Dempsey, regarded as a ring idol in Chicago, figures to draw one of the biggest crowds that ever witnessed a boxing show in the stadium. And, so far as known, Dave Barry will not be the referee.

Barry was the man charged with giving Tunney the "long count" after Dempsey had knocked him down in his first comeback attempt following Tunney's victory in Philadelphia.

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
