

LEGION MAKES ARRANGEMENTS FOR POW WOW

Woodburn—A special meeting of Woodburn Post No. 46 of the American Legion was held at the armory Thursday night to perfect plans for the district conference to be held in Woodburn January 27, to work out the problem of putting the city park in shape for baseball and to hear reports on the successful membership drive which just closed.

About 500 Legionnaires are expected to attend the conference and will gather at St. Luke's hall for a banquet which will be served under the direction of the auxiliary by the women of St. Luke's parish. All state and district heads are expected to be present and Dr. John M. Hazen, commander of the local post, will preside. HILL CLEARED UPON CHARGES FILED IN POLK

Independence—The jury in the case of state vs. Willie Hill of this city, brought in a verdict of not guilty Thursday afternoon after being out several hours. The charge was one of larceny from a dwelling, and the prosecution was based largely upon the testimony of two confessed prisoners who are now doing time in state institutions.

It was contended by the state that Hill was an accomplice of Henry Gentemann, Maynard Grooms and Delmar Scraftford, who were charged with entering the residence of Alfred Cox, of Monmouth on the night of November 14 and stealing a shotgun. The state also endeavored to show that Hill was in a car with the others when the Cox house was entered that subsequently he was with them when an effort was made to dispose with the gun at an Independence garage.

Gentemann and Grooms admitted the guilt some time ago. Gentemann being given a penitentiary term and Grooms was sent to the reform school until he is 21. Oscar Hayter of Dallas represented the defense. Willie Hill is the son of Mr. and Mrs. Homer Hill of this city and whose grandparents were the early founders of this city, giving land for the original town site of Independence. Delmar Scraftford is the youngest son of K. D. Scraftford of Suver and a grandson of Mrs. Marshall Scraftford, whose parents were among the early settlers in Polk county. His grandfather, Marshall Scraftford, was at one time a sheriff in Polk county in the early days and was a Civil war veteran.
