

JUDGE REFUSES PLEA OF GUILTY IN KIDNAP CASE

Albany—Judge L. H. McMahon continued the case of David Spencer, charged with enticing Ethel Pierce, 15-year-old daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George Pierce of Plainview, away from her home last March, for further consideration, after Spencer had pleaded guilty in circuit court Friday. Spencer's lawyer put Mrs. Edna Purdy, Spencer's sister on the stand and also Spencer. Both alleged that Miss Pierce had taken the initiative in running away and had told Spencer that if he didn't go with her she would go alone.

Judge McMahon, the district attorney and the defendant's lawyer engaged in a lively tilt and the judge said under such circumstances he was placed in the position of sentencing an innocent man to prison. The judge suggested that the case be submitted to a jury to determine Spencer's guilt or innocence. The district attorney argued that Spencer is guilty of the charge by virtue of his own act in running away with a 15-year-old girl, and that it was immaterial, even if Spencer and his sister were telling the truth, whether the girl consented to the act. He pointed out that the girl was within the age provided in the statute and that the purpose of it is to protect girls who are too young to realize the consequences of the act.

The girl's parents have not heard from her since she left her home almost a year ago.

Geer Historical Record And "Antiquary" Unique And Extremely Valuable

Waldo Hills—Mrs. C. C. Geer of Waldo Hills is spending many days during the winter months building links in the chain of early Oregon economic and political history as she sorts and files clippings, letters and legal documents. Once the property of her husband's grandfather, Ralph C. Geer, one of Oregon's prominent early pioneers, Mr. and Mrs. Geer and their daughter, Ruth, after some years in Woodburn, Salem and elsewhere, a few months ago returned to the Waldo Hills and settled on the old home place of Phil Bower and Samantha Geer Bower. The house, over 60 years old, was built on the corner of the old Ralph Geer donation land claim. Mrs. Bowers was his daughter. It is in this house that Mrs. Geer has made her "finds."

Mrs. Geer, who was not born a Geer, or even an Oregon pioneer, at once set to work preserving the pioneer souvenirs. An appropriate setting for her work is the living room of the old homestead. Still leaning on the large fireplace of brick is the heavy iron poker formed by Phil Bower in pioneer years. Through its years of leaning and service it has worn a deep niche into the bricks, and this the Geers are not repairing.

Above the fireplace is a Kentucky squirrel gun hanging on hand cut pegs of wood. An old "Welcome" motto hangs at its side. Ida Geer Clynner made this while a young girl.

The letters and other documents which Mrs. Geer is sorting and filing give much valuable information concerning the early life in Oregon before Oregon was even a state. The letters, many of them written by federal officials from Washington City, now Washington, D. C., are in long hand as are also the legal documents. In many cases, even the "seals" are written out. Some of the letters are marked "Strictly Confidential," while others are merely marked "Personal." Many of them contain matters of great importance to the country at that time. Dates indicate that often two months elapsed before replies could be had to these important letters. One letter from John P. Delano, Smith was dated "Washington City, March 13, 1839" and began "Your letter of the 13th day of January was received by Pacific Mail."

The bundle of letters contained one to Ralph Geer from Senator B. F. Harding, dated January 16, 1863. This dealt with the gloom which hung over Washington at the time of the Civil war. The letter indicated that considerable fear was felt as to the outcome of the war. Senator Harding was a son-in-law of Thomas Cox, pioneer merchant, for whom a tablet was unveiled at Salem last September.

Another letter was from A. D. Babcock from Polk county, written Nov. 22, 1837, advising Mr. Geer of his appointment as commissioner for his county. Still another letter from Senator Harding urges Geer to vote for Logan in the 1860 election.

Of an entirely different character and giving an indication of another side of pioneer life is a letter from John P. Delano, Smith, from Lexington, Kentucky, dated June 30, 1838, telling of the safe arrival at San Francisco of "Rifleman," a thoroughbred race horse, and offering to sell a half interest in him for \$5,000. The horse later became a well known race horse on the Pacific coast tracks.

There was a program from the grand anniversary ball of April 26, 1839. The reception committee was composed of M. R. Cox, Ed Kibby, B. L. Norton, J. H. Lyon, J. T. Bloomfield, A. J. Apperson, A. J. Brown, E. Schultz. The evening's program included quadrilles, schottisches, mazourkas, valsevues, quadrilles Les Lanciers, waltzes, lancers, choice, and chests.

Among the papers was a document in which R. C. Geer agreed to sell his crop of apples to Thomas T. Eyre, fall apples to bring \$7 a bushel, winter apples to bring \$8. Eyre was to furnish the paper for packing the apples. This document was dated in "Oregon Territory, Aug. 14, 1837."

Mrs. Geer has set aside a room which she calls "antiquary" and in this she is placing pieces of furniture and other relics of pioneer days. Among the things stored here is a framed certificate of the names of those who fought in the famous Abiqua Indian battle not far from Silverton. The paper bears the date of Feb. 28, 1848. Ralph Geer was captain of the company. At that time this Champanoe county. Sixty-two men were enrolled. William Parker was first lieutenant; L. D. Harpole, second lieutenant and W. King, ensign.

In this room are also old quilt patterns, a music box which will still grind out "Flow Gently Sweet Afton," "Work for the Night is Coming," and others. There are also original cartoons by Homer Davenport and Frank Bowers, both famous cartoonists and both grandsons of Ralph C. Geer. Mr. Davenport died while at the high point of his career and Mr. Bowers, because of ill health, was forced to give up his chosen work. However, he now lives very close to the old pioneer Bower home where he was born and any Waldo Hills resident who is able to secure a Bowers cartoon feels highly honored for Mr. Bowers has lost none of his ability.

There are also here old diaries giving information of the old Oregon-California railway, the old narrow gauge road, an old song book from 1856 and histories and arithmetics from 1874.
