

HOOVER FILES CANDIDACY FOR POLK SHERIFF

Dallas—Sheriff T. B. Hoover, who has served in office for several years, is a candidate for re-election again this year, filing his declaration of office with the county clerk Thursday. He has served in his present capacity since January 1, 1925, having been elected the previous November, after serving as chief deputy sheriff under Sheriff John W. Orr from December 1, 1914.

Though born in Morrow county, Sheriff Hoover has spent most of his life in Polk county, his parents having moved to a farm near Airle when he was a mere lad. He was educated in the public schools of the county and later assisted his father on the farm. In 1905 he moved to Eugene where he completed a course in the Eugene Business college, moving to Falls City in 1906 to accept a position with the Falls City lumber company, a position he held until appointed chief deputy sheriff.

In addition to the criminal work of the office, an important phase of the law collection department. During his seven years in office Sheriff Hoover has collected \$3,893,535.27 from a total of \$4,099,152.85, leaving a delinquency of only about five percent for the seven year period he has served.

Sheriff Hoover, makes the following statement:

"My present term as sheriff will expire at the end of this year. It seems but fitting that I should make some statement as to whether I intend to become a candidate for re-election at the primary election to be held next May.

"In response I would say that such is my expectation. If I had never held the office I might also be making some statement as to whether I intend to become a candidate for re-election at the primary election to be held next May.

"I have always been and will continue to be my constant endeavor to render a competent and efficient service in the interpretation, administration and enforcement of the laws of the state, and in defense of its interests.

"I have always and I intend to run the office exactly as I would my own private business.

"I always have adhered to a rule taught by my father. To remember that people who come to you to do business have confidence in you and to never do anything to destroy that confidence."
