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RELIEF GRAIN MOVES TO CHINA

Portland, Jan. 28 (AP)—Despite the rumblings of war guns in and around Shanghai, the movement of the farm board's 15,000,000 bushels of wheat and flour to China continues without change, Henry W. Collins, regional director of the Farmers' National Grain corporation, said today. He is supervising the movement.

Collins admitted, however, he is somewhat disturbed by today's developments, but he said he has had no orders to halt the movement or delay loading of ships to await further developments. The board will continue to move the wheat and flour on previously arranged schedules, he declared.

The motorship Childer left Portland early today for Shanghai with 100,000 bushels of wheat and 47,500 barrels of flour, part of the supply sold by the farm board to the Chinese government. Much wheat and flour is already afloat and on the way over from north Pacific ports.

HAWLEY HEARD ON TAX ISSUE

Harrisburg, Pa., Jan. 28 (AP)—Congressman Willis C. Hawley, of Oregon, co-author of the much discussed Smoot-Hawley tariff bill, testified before the Senate Finance committee today without mentioning him by name, in the strongest terms. It will be presented at a public hearing tomorrow morning.

Sir Eric Drummond, secretary general, said he hoped the strength of the note would placate the Chinese and prevent their invocation of articles 15 and 16 asking punitive action against Japan.

In the presidential declaration the council of twelve voluntarily calls attention of China and Japan to their obligations under article 10 of the league covenant which guarantees member nations against aggression.

He suggested a nationwide investigation of the "imposition of taxes" with a view to obtaining a more equal distribution of assessments. "A scientific system of taxation," he said, "could be substituted for our present condition of inequitable and duplicate taxation."

The telephone bill for state offices here is about \$25,000 a year, William E. Hines, secretary of the state board of control informed the members at a called meeting here this noon. His announcement was made in the preliminary report on consolidation of the phone systems and the proposed installation of a central phone system at the state capitol.

Being reported a survey would be completed next week and the consolidation plan would be ready for consideration by the board. The installation of a single system was suggested some time ago by Hal E. Hoes, secretary of state.

The board also authorized increasing the state restoration fund to take care of the additional buildings constructed during the past two years. There is about \$90,000 in the present fund, which is maintained in form of cash and bonds on state buildings. No amount of increase was set by the board.

Governor Willard L. Marks presided at the meeting, which was attended by Rufus C. Holman, the third member, Hal E. Hoes, was absent.

Filipino Hawaiian Workers Destitute

Manila, P. I. (AP)—The lot of many Filipino workers in Hawaii, victims of unemployment, was described by Fausto N. Cerralde, general secretary of the Gran Oriente, labor organization of Filipinos in Hawaii, in a letter to Hugo Ritaga, president of the Oriental labor union here.

Cerralde said many of his countrymen were forced to roam the streets and often times resort to begging for food.

He said some jobs for Filipinos are being taken care of by Filipino labor organizations in Hawaii, but these labor groups are not financially able to meet all such demands.

LEAGUE BACKS AMERICAN PLAN

Geneva, Jan. 28 (AP)—The league of nations, in a presidential declaration drafted to China and Japan today, associated itself with the American "open door" viewpoint with reference to Manchuria, and took the firmest position yet exhibited in its handling of the Far Eastern crisis.

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BRONKEY BETTER LATEST REPORT

Portland, Jan. 28 (AP)—Improvement in the condition of Ed Bronkey, Mt. Angel farmer, who was injured in an automobile accident near that town Wednesday, was seen by attendants at St. Vincent's hospital here today. His nurse said he was comfortable Sunday night, and is conscious.

The nature of his injuries had not been determined this morning, but an X-ray examination was to be made during the day. A superficial examination at the scene of the accident disclosed his suffered a fractured leg and possible internal injuries. An X-ray examination was not made last night because of his shocked condition.

Bronkey was injured when his automobile collided head on with a sedan carrying members of a Tacoma basketball team.

CHILD DENTIST TO BE DISCUSSED

Dr. Charles A. Sweet of Oakland, Calif., recognized nationally as an authority on child dentistry, will be in Salem Monday and Tuesday to address meetings of dentists and laymen. His visit in Oregon and to Salem is being sponsored through the educational fund of the Oregon state dental board, a portion of the annual registration fees for dentists being set aside by law into this educational fund.

Monday noon Dr. Sweet will speak at the chamber of commerce luncheon. He will address a meeting of dentists from Marion, Polk, Yamhill, Tillamook and part of Clackamas counties Monday night at the chamber of commerce rooms. Tuesday Dr. Sweet will do actual clinic work at the office of Dr. D. X. Beechler, explaining methods and going over problem questions with groups of from 10 to 15 dentists for three sessions, to be held at 8 and 10 a. m. and 2 p. m. Tuesday night he will be the speaker at the regular tri-county dental association meeting.

Dr. Sweet will come to Salem from Portland, where he will be over the week-end, conducting similar educational conferences with Portland dentists. He already had addressed and consulted with dentists at Medford, Marshfield and Klamath Falls before completing the tour arranged by the state dental board.

DONEY BACK FROM METHODIST BOARD

Methodist universities and colleges who fail to live up to the recommendations of the university senate, will be refused financial assistance from the Methodist board of education, Dr. C. G. Doney, president of the Willamette university, said today. Wednesday from an eastern trip which included participation in the sessions of the senate at Chicago in December, stated upon his arrival here. Nothing which transpired during the session of the senate affected Willamette in any way, Doney says. However, three or four schools in the east and south which have ignored the recommendations of the governing body will probably be compelled to finance themselves in the future.

Some of the schools are in bad condition financially, Doney says, especially one in the Ozark mountains which decided to expand into a regular four year college institution instead of performing the functions of a junior college. The college is virtually bankrupt.

Asked if he found anyone who would finance one or two badly needed buildings on the local campus, Dr. Doney replied "they didn't make themselves known if they were there."

Salem now has eight standard grades and this fall saw the start of the first four year high school course, Dry said. It is best to get the pupils as near to six years old as possible for the best results. The best of the Braille readers can read from one-third to one-half as fast as the average sight reader. Recreation is chiefly wrestling and dancing. Dry stated, with the greatest problem that in fitting the individual blind into the economic structure. Contact with the outside world is one of the greatest needs of the Oregon institution.

General educational work among the blind was described for the Lions club Thursday noon by Walter E. Dry, superintendent of the state school for the blind. Residential schools are now operated by 42 of the states, he said. These group
