

THREE YOUTHS COMPLETE AIM OF VOCATIONS

Silverton—Three boys are graduating this semester from the senior high school Smith-Hughes vocational agricultural department, of which Warren E. Crabtree is instructor.

Daughton, Clifford Hadley and Clifford Maulding are completing four years' work in farm animals and farm shop, soils and crops, poultry and horticulture, and rural engineering. With each year's undertakings different projects must be carried on which gives the boy the actual experience of his "job" while he pursues his school duties.

Special projects for the graduates were: For Foote, experimental fertilizing of potatoes, poultry and actual farm management; Hadley specialized in sheep, potatoes, beans and swine; Maulding in corn fertilizing, potatoes and dairying. Probably the most effective and practical year's work of the four, is that offered in the senior year of engineering, which includes practice in machinery repairing, land drainage, gas engines, auto repair work, water supply and sewage disposal, road work, metal work, lighting and heating, blacksmithing, and building plans. Elementary surveying is also one of the many practical phases of the final year's doings.

The working project is a vital part of the course and is necessary for graduation.

SNOW PLOWS USED ON DETROIT ROAD

Mill City—Over 12 inches of snow fell Wednesday on top of the six inches already on the ground in the Detroit region. Snow plows have been operating the past week to keep the road open to traffic.

Several small trees crashed during the day due to the weight of the snow and had to be cleared from the highway. The road from Falls into Detroit is considered bad for auto driving.

Considerable improvement is being made at several of the sharp points along the route, a crew of six and eight men being employed the past few weeks in dynamiting and cutting off the points between Niagara and Detroit, one at the drift and others at Sardinia are completed and two more sharp turns are to be cut down, widening the roadbed considerably.
