They had been gone from the house only a few minutes when the neighbor heard shots. She ran out to see Mrs. Donovan lying on the ground and Donovan running from the scene with blood streaming from his head.

Donovan staggered to an abandoned house not far from the scene of the shooting and there shot himself a second time. Both were dead when police arrived.

DAVEY TO SEEK RECORDER'S JOB

That the race for city recorder in the city elections of this year will be at least a three cornered affair became known Friday when it was announced with reasonable certainty that Frank Davey will be a candidate.

It is known that friends of Mr. Davey, some of them members of the city council, have asked him to run, and some registration does not indicate strongly that he will be one of the contenders.

A feeling that something is going to happen in Mexico, comes over the observant traveler in that country, declared Alexander Vasakas, professor of languages at Willamette university, in telling of some of his observations during a trip to the country to the south last summer before the Salem Ad club Friday noon. Prof. Vasakas, who was stirring times in the Balkans during the war and afterwards said the same feeling of impending important events was felt in that part of the world, but that the situation in Mexico portended greater happenings.

The fusion of the Aztec and Spaniard has resulted in the bringing forth of an entirely new race of hospitable, soft-spoken and friendly people, the speaker said, who are coming rapidly to the front with their creations in sculpture, art, painting and other work. Prof. Vasakas eulogized the Jesuits in the manner in which they instructed the youth of Mexico, declaring they were the best teachers in the world.

Fulton said the money derived from sale of the veteran airship would be applied to increase the size and efficiency of the ZRS-5, sister ship of the dirigible Akron.

\$300,000 COSTS FOR ARMS CONFERENCE

Washington, Jan. 29 (AP)—The appropriation to pay expenses of the United States delegation to the Geneva arms limitation conference was definitely limited to \$300,000 today when the house concurred with the senate in passing that amount. Originally \$450,000 was authorized.

Dartmoor, Eng., Jan. 29 (AP)—Dartmoor prison convicts rioted last night for the second time this week.

This night in the prison was described as "hulduous" with scores of prisoners standing for hours at the doors of their cells to shout threats at their wardens.

The first riot occurred last Sunday.

83,000 TROUT TO GIVE AWAY

The Marion County Game Protective association and the Santiam Game Protective association of Linn county have 83,000 eastern brook trout that they want to get rid of. They are not wanted in the streams of either county, because they are too big for planting purposes, and the two associations will ask the state game commission either to trade as associations with other kinds of trout for them or give them away to someone.

In the distribution of trout for planting purposes the two counties were allotted 1,110,000. In the Roaring river country. In this allotment were 110,000 eastern brook trout, but only 27,000 will be put into Marion and Linn county streams. Warner lake in Linn county is to get 10,000 and Indian Prairie lake 40,000 of them. In Marion county 10,000 will go to Deep lake and 2000 to Dunigan lake near Salem.

Ben F. Claggett, representing the Marion county association, said the 83,000 might be used if they were fingerlings, but their size makes it almost impossible to use them.

With the exception of cutthroats all fish planted are to be divided equally between Marion and Linn counties. Marion county will deposit 400,000 in the Big North Fork of the Santiam and 50,000 in the Little North Fork. While Linn county will plant 225,000 in the South Fork.

Of the cutthroats Marion county gets 60 per cent and Linn 40 per cent. Marion will plant 20,000 each in Butte, Albion and Silver creeks, and Linn will divide 10,000 among Thomas, Blue and Burnester lakes. McNeil, Hamilton and Calapooya are to get 10,000 each.

STRANGE POISON MALADY GROWING

Fresno, Cal., Jan. 29 (AP)—The ravages of thallium poisoning spread with a mounting toll of death as physicians battled vainly against the disease which was spreading from a renowned toxicologist.

Mrs. Celia Deloa, 28, died at General hospital last night, the sixth victim of the poisoning which has attacked Mexican farm workers since they ate poisoned barley at a dance more than two weeks ago.

Alexandro Deloa, the woman's husband, has lapsed into the coma which precedes death, physicians said. Seven other patients are in a critical condition at the Fresno hospital and a 19 year old girl is receiving treatment at Visalia, near here.

Although little hope was held for the victims, doctors were confident that Dr. J. C. Munch, famous Pennsylvania specialist in route here, would be able to prolong their lives.

Dr. Munch, interviewed at Omaha, Neb., last night as he boarded a westbound airplane, told the United Press he believed large doses of potassium iodine might temporarily save the victims. He said the mixing of this chemical with thallium forms an insoluble solution.

FEHLEN ACQUITTED OF DEER SLAYING

In a case that has attracted unusual attention in Marion county, a jury in justice court Friday returned a not guilty verdict in favor of James D. Fehlen, accused of shooting deer out of season.

Fehlen, Charles Rich and Fred Niggl, all living in the Lyons country, were arrested for the same offense, the killing of two deer that were found in their car by state game officers. Rich and Niggl both pleaded guilty. Fehlen decided to stand trial.

Pending the outcome of the Fehlen case Justice of the Peace Hayden deferred sentence on Rich and Niggl. When the jury acquitted Fehlen the court, after discussing the case with the officers and attorneys, continued sentence for 30 days for Rich and Niggl and released them on their own recognizance. What is done at the end of the 30 days will depend on developments between now and then.

The carcasses of the two deer were exhibited in court.

DIES IN THE RING

Atlanta, Jan. 29 (AP)—Imas R. Calman of Birmingham, Ala., 21-year-old Emory university sophomore, died today from overexertion in an intercollegiate boxing tournament last night. Calman collapsed during the third round of the match.

TREE 3000 YEARS OLD

London (AP)—There is a yew tree in Scotland called the "Portingall," for which is claimed the age of about 3000 years.

BRITAIN HAS 3,500,000 DOGS

London (AP)—There are 3,500,000 dogs owned by people in Great Britain at the present time.

GAIN STUDENTS AT WILLAMETTE

Registration for the second semester at Willamette university is showing an increase over last year, Registrar Tennant stated Friday after a preliminary check of the first four days. The exact number of students who will be in school during the second semester will not be known until the first of next week since registration does not close until Saturday afternoon.

At the close of business Thursday evening the figures show that 9 per cent more students had registered than for a similar time last year. The percentage of increase for new students who had never attended Willamette before is the same, 9 per cent. That the local school is more than holding its own as compared with others is indicated from the fact that the registration at the University of Oregon is reported 16 per cent below last year.

The number of students who dropped out during the first semester of this year shows a 1.2 per cent decrease over the first half of last season despite the cry of hard times. There was a 5.4 per cent withdrawal during the first term last year, Registrar Tennant stated as compared with 4.2 per cent this year. More funds for student loans is one reason for taking up the slack in the number who are forced to quit school, the registrar believes.

Early in the year members of the faculty assessed themselves a certain amount of their salaries, the money to be used as a revolving fund to be loaned to needed students.

During the prolonged legislative fight, several senators declared they had received threats of death if they voted against the LaFollette program.

The doubled tax is effective on 1931 incomes. The emergency tax is levied on dividends of Wisconsin corporations, hitherto exempt, and prevents deduction of capital losses. The corporation income tax is not increased. A two-year tax on chain stores also was passed.

The unemployment insurance plan is voluntary if 175,000 workers are placed within its scope by their employers before June 1, 1932. Otherwise the law becomes compulsory. Only employers contribute to a fund which must equal \$75 for each eligible worker. Those earning more than \$1500 a year are ineligible. A maximum of \$10 a week for 10 weeks would be paid the jobs.

SHANGHAI RADIO STATION BOMBED

Shanghai, Jan. 29 (AP)—A Chinese wireless station which normally communicates directly with Europe and the United States went out of commission today when the control lines from the international settlement through the Chapel district were destroyed.

American engineers set up a temporary circuit by way of Manila and Java.

This afternoon Japanese planes bombed a stretch of track on the Shanghai-Nanking railway, bottled up a Chinese armored train. The break severed railway communication with Nanking and presumably cut off all the telegraph and telephone communication. Before the wires went down there was word with Nanking that additional Chinese troops were on the way to Shanghai.

MUTUAL SAVINGS AMENDS ARTICLES

Supplementary articles of incorporation have been filed with the county clerk by H. C. White, J. C. Perry, A. A. Lee, L. O. Clement, J. C. Helzel, Ralph Cooley and L. H. Van Winkle as directors of the Mutual Savings & Loan association.

The supplementary articles have been approved by over two-thirds vote of the stockholders, it is stated. The object of them, James C. Helzel, attorney explained, was to take all stock out of the guarantee class, certain shares having been carrying a guarantee of payment of so much interest similar to shares of preferred stock. The supplementary articles provide that the association may issue all classes and shares of stock which are or may be authorized by law by mutual savings and loan associations. All stock of the association issued prior to January 14, 1932 and the outstanding stock shall be and remain as issued but all the rights and liabilities of the holders of such stock shall then and thereafter be as presented and defined by the articles of incorporation and supplements thereof.

Pope Pius To Bless Listeners on Radio

New York, Jan. 29 (AP)—Pope Pius XI will bless American radio listeners in a broadcast from St. Peter's cathedral at Vatican City February 14 at 6 a.m. EST.
