GENERAL DEBATE FOR TAXPAYERS SLATED MONDAY

Central Howell—Taxpayers of the Central Howell school district No. 40 held a meeting at the school house on Wednesday evening. The meeting was called by John Landreback, chairman of the school board for the purpose of ascertaining the sentiment of this district in regard to the present high school tuition and transportation laws.

The people of Mt. Angel district have started a controversy in an effort to get an injunction on some other action to throw out the present law and stop the collection of public tax for the maintenance of said law. Several districts in this locality have called meetings for the purpose of determining the sentiment of the people.

This meeting was opened by Landreback and then turned over to Mr. Robert Goetz, superintendent of Silverton schools. Goetz explained the purpose and workings of the tuition and transportation laws of Oregon and various other subjects pertaining to these laws, and other high school questions. Goetz also answered numerous questions put by the audience.

To obtain the sentiment of this district, the chairman asked for a standing vote, with the exception of one or two who remained neutral, this meeting was unanimous in favor of the law as it now stands. The results of this meeting will be conveyed to what is understood to be a general meeting to be held at Mt. Angel Monday evening.

DEHLER FARM HOME BURNED TO GROUND

Mollala—The farm house of J. W. Dehler was completely destroyed by fire Thursday afternoon about 5 o'clock on his place three miles northeast of Mollala.

The harness, seven saddles and halters belonged to Clarence Warren of London, who has contracted to put on the Mollala Buckaroo in 1932 and who furnished the stock for the Rodeo Buckaroo last year at the state fair. No insurance was carried on these articles. \$1000 insurance was carried on the house. The Mollala volunteer fire department answered the call and were able to save the other buildings.

SALEM REALTOR FACING ACTION IN LINN COURT

Albany—Alleging that Thomas Large, Salem real estate dealer, and Charles E. Greene and Anna Greene his wife, entered into a conspiracy to defraud her in a real estate transaction in which she traded two tracts of land aggregating 163 acres in township 10 south, range 1 west, for West Salem property and owned by the Greens, Mary Jacobs, 71, a widow, filed an action in circuit court here late Friday asking for a court order reconveying her property to her.

Joe Holub, who loaned the Greens money on the Jacobs land subsequent to their taking possession of it, is also made a defendant in the action.

Mrs. Jacobs says that her lands were worth \$9000 when she was induced to trade them for the West Salem property and that they were encumbered with a \$2200 mortgage. Mrs. Jacobs alleges that Large and the Greens represented that the Salem property was worth the same amount and carried a \$5000 mortgage. She was told, she complains that the rentals of the property would aggregate \$300 a year in excess of principal and interest payments, taxes and other fixed charges and she alleges that the Greens guaranteed that she would receive this \$300 income.

Since then she has learned that the West Salem property is worth only \$2000 and that she has not received the \$300 income as guaranteed. Mrs. Jacobs asks for a judgment cancelling a \$100 note she gave to the Greens as part payment of the difference between the two mortgages, the conveyance of her former property to her, the payment of \$800 which represents the difference between the new mortgage held by Holub and the former mortgage of \$2200 and \$2000 damages.
