

ASTORIA AND SALEM QUINTS CLASH SATURDAY EVE

Fishermen Are Defeated By Huntington Squad During Exciting Contest

"We'll get you Saturday night," exclaimed a half dozen Fishermen as they trotted from the floor Friday night following a hair raising finish between basketball quint of Salem and Astoria high school. Coach Huntington's men won the affair Friday night 19 to 18, but they had nothing to brag about since the visitors, staging a sensational rally in the final quarter, nearly overcame a 17 to 5 advantage which Salem had during one stage of the second half.

Whether the local squad will be content to be a three-quarter team will be determined Saturday evening when it meets the Fishermen in the second game of the series.

A slim youngster, who comes well by his name of "Lefty" Palmberg, nearly wrecked Salem's chance of victory Friday night. It was this boy, whose left handed shots center the hoop with startling ease, who egged his companions on to the last quarter whirlwind finish. Prior to that dying effort, Astoria's sharpshooters had little luck with their shots while their teamwork at times was extremely ragged. Salem had possession of the ball a great portion of the time, but they, too, missed many chances which should have resulted in scores.

Salem was never headed from the time Sanford broke through to score directly from beneath the basket for the first tally of the evening, although the visitors tied it at three-all during the first quarter.

The wrestling team of Salem high school coached by Pat Hogue, nearly made a clean sweep of the events with Tillamook high grapplers in the local gym Friday night. As it was, Salem took six of the seven matches and won by the impressive score of 96 to 33. The top-sided score, however, does not give any indication of the closeness of some of the contests, since several of them were extended to the full three rounds in order that a decision might be reached.

The bout between Paul Tennant and L. Ellis and the one between Fisher of Salem and Winrich of Tillamook were the hardest fought of the evening. Tennant lost the first round to his opponents by a decision only to come back, and through his aggressiveness, win two straight falls. Fisher won a decision from Winrich after five minutes of tugging and hauling. The Tillamook boy, however, held Fisher even in the second round, but the latter took the match with a fall in the final frame.

Don Sugar had an easy time winning his contest with Carver. Sugar took a fall in two minutes and later the match when Carver failed to appear for the second round.

New York, Jan. 30 (AP)—Madison Square Garden's heavy-weight elimination tournament to find a possible alternate for either of the principals in the Schmeling-Sharkey title fight next June, today was progressing rapidly with Max Baer and King Levinsky apparently among the eliminated.

The two kings of the ring attended to their own eliminations personally in the temple of sport last night where they fought 10 dull rounds to a decision for Baer. They made faces at each other, they laughed in glee as one or the other occasionally landed a wild swing or missed one—it seemed to make no difference which—but as far as proving themselves fit ring companions for either the champ or Sharkey they decidedly did not.

By his victory, Baer technically won the right to face the winner of next week's 15 round struggle between Paulino Urasudan and Ernie Schaaf but, after the fight, Jimmy Johnston, boxing impresario at the Garden, was non-committal on his plans for such a meeting.

Baer forced what little fighting there was and raised an angry red welt on the King Fish's side where he clubbed the Chicago boy interminably with his right at close quarters.

The famous looping right swing with which the King Fish thrice knocked down Tommy Loughran recently and used to good advantage to pound out a decision over the rugged Paulino failed to stop the California butcher boy or even hurt him the few times it landed.
