LINN MARKET ROAD SYSTEM INCREASED

Albany—In the past year Linn county spent \$79,969.83 on its market road system, it was announced by C. H. Leonard, county engineer. The road and bridge miles were added to the system by new construction and betterments on four miles of road cost \$63,800.79. Maintenance work on 140.5 miles accounted for \$15,518.15 of the total expenditure, and \$75,633.34 was taken from market road funds and \$4,336.49 from other sources.
