## Leap Year Means Little to Erie Girls

Erie, Pa. (AP)—Erie girls don't take advantage of the "leap year" tradition to propose marriage to their bashful or otherwise silent swains.

It just isn't being done, one of the girls explained, although she admitted that perhaps there were many who would like to.

Figures born here, too, to show that marriage license totals in leap years fall short of the number granted in the years immediately preceding and following the one with the extra day.

In 1928 the license clerk issued 1,436 wedding permits, as against 1,458 for the year before and 1,468 for the year after.

In 1924, licenses totaled 1,417, and for 1922, 1,426.

The girl of 12 years ago may not have been so reductionist, for license that year reached a high mark of 1,762, whereas there were only 1,826 issued in 1928.

## California Shows Barium Silicate

San Francisco, Calif. (AP)—The first barium silicate to be found in its pure state, has been identified by A. F. Rogers, head of the mineralogy department at Stanford university, and given the name, Sanbornite, in honor of Frank Sanborn, a determined mineralogist of the California bureau of mines.

This is the 26th new mineral found in California since 1860, and although pure barium silicate has been crystallized in the geophysical laboratory at Washington, D. C., this discovery is the first of the new mineral.
