

NEW ORDINANCE FOR SILVERTON BEFORE COUNCIL

Silverton—The principal undertaking of the Silverton city council at the regular meeting Monday night was the first and second readings of city ordinance No. 253, known as the depository ordinance. Other business of the session consisted of reports of committees, reading of bills, discussion of light arrangements and suggestions for an expert examination on insuring the police car was in the business district. Definite action, and the report from the Marion county health department on milk bacterial count was considered. Councilman McGinnis was absent from the city and Councilman Garvin was absent on account of illness. There were present, Mayor Eastman, George Hubbs, recorder, and councilmen Conrad, Legard, Wilson and Reynolds.

J. E. Binkhorn, Salem, dairy and food inspector of the health department, presented a written report to the council on the bacterial count of milk being delivered to the city of Silverton, showing the count satisfactory for all dairies that were contributing, with one exception, where the count approached too high a score.

The report of the financial committee was accepted. Discussion of the possibility of placing the city rest-room lights and the city hall lights on the same meter was considered, a report from the health department on earwig control was read and suggestions for tentative plans to clean the streets of the business district after midnight with a different method of disposing of the refuse was favorably commented upon after being brought up for discussion by Councilman Conrad under the head of new business. The bill for insuring the city protest car was ordered paid.

Summary of the last regular meeting minutes read by the recorder, and of the two special meetings, recognized the acceptance of petitions concerning the wishes of citizens in regard to the kind of material to be used in the reconstruction of the James avenue bridge across Silver creek, also concerning materials for sewer construction on Second street. The opening of bids for bridge plans and construction was postponed to a special meeting set for Monday, March 14.

In explanation of the main feature of the council's Monday program, the depository ordinance, No. 253, Councilman Reynolds summarized the need of this addition, and also the necessity of it to the members of the city council, directly. This ordinance is sometimes known and better understood as the treasurer's bond ordinance, and has to do with the responsibility of placing funds in other depositories rather than those banks designated by the city council, in case of bank insolvency, and in placing the responsibility for the loss of such public funds in case of bank insolvency, on the party or parties reliable, bonding companies and city treasurer especially considered. In short, if the city treasurer places it upon himself to deposit city funds in banks that the city council has not specified, and such banks become insolvent, the treasurer is responsible for such loss, personally. The object seems to be to protect, fairly, the public funds in the city, and those responsible for the reimbursement, merely in case of bank insolvency. This arrangement could not be passed by resolution, on the first and second readings were given the bill.

TWO TONER HAS CHANCE TO USE COUNTY PRISON

Silverton—Upon complaint signed by Cliff Dickinson, a bad check artist came to trial at Silverton Monday in Justice P. L. Brown's court. The case was turned over to S. A. Pinner, constable of the Silverton district of Marion county justice, by the city officers who arrested the artist at the Knights of Pythias hall Saturday night when the Oregon Loggers were appearing in program. Five checks written for amounts from \$1 to \$250, aggregating \$9 on the Mt. Angel bank and on the Ocoochee and McClain bank of Silverton, were signed "George W. Hamlin, Jr." and no such party had ever had an account with either institution. The checks were made payable to Cliff Dickinson, Olsen Pharmacy, Steelhammer Drug company, Rainbow restaurant and Campbell's service station.

The offender was 22 years of age and has been known among Silverton people since the first week in December, as the "two-toner" whistler, appearing on a number of programs playing his own banjo or guitar accompaniments to his unusual two-toned whistling. He says that Hamlin is his real name and that his parents live in Bloomington, Ill. He had been employed on the John Drake farm until ten days ago, after which he wrote the bad checks, giving his reason as unemployment and no money. He further states this is his first criminal offense. He claims to have an income from an estate of an uncle, but could give no definite proof of his having received allowances as he could not tell where the checks sent him were cashed January 4. Hamlin pleaded guilty and received a fine of \$15 and 30 days in the county jail.
