Oregon State College, Corvallis, April 1.—Football fans will have a chance to see Oregon State college's 1932 football team in action when a team of all-stars meets the 1932 varsity in a regulation game, under the new rules, here Saturday night at 7:30 o'clock. The game will wind up six weeks of spring practice.

With one exception—Rory Lamb—the all-star team is composed of players who recently made their football letters at Oregon State. Lamb, while playing for Lombard, was chosen by the famous "four horsemen" of Notre Dame as being the greatest quarterback they had ever faced.

Worsham To Become Athletics Manager

New York, April 1 (AP)—When Major Philip B. Fleming, graduate manager of athletics at the United States military academy leaves West Point in June, 1933, his place in the athletic department will be taken by Major L. D. Worsham, now district engineer at Memphis. This became known at Washington last night when announcement was made that Major Worsham will report to West Point on August 1 of this year to serve as engineer instructor and also as understudy to Fleming until the latter's term ends.

Major Fleming was to have left West Point this year but the transfer to Louisiana state university of Captain Lawrence (Biff) Jones made it necessary for the major to remain for another year.

200 'Fastest' Toad Racers Entered In Derby Event

Palm Springs, Calif., April 1 (AP)—Whoopie, entered by Eddie Cantor, and Schnozzie, a fast stepper that it's owner, Jimmy Durante, expects will win by a nose, ruled the favorites to win today's first international horned toad derby in Palm Canyon.

More than 200 of the country's fastest toad racers have been entered in the race, including one each by Gov. James Rolph, Jr., of California, Gov. George W. P. Hunt of Arizona, Gov. Calles of Sonora, Mexico, and Gov. Olachea of Baja California, Mexico.

"Miss Arizona," who claims the world championship, will carry the colors of Gov. Hunt. "Sunshine Ike" is the California governor's entry. The race will be held this afternoon, being preceded by a Spanish fiesta and barbecue.

MAJOR LEAGUERS FACING DEFICIT

New York, April 1 (AP)—Faced with 10 per cent taxation on their tickets and the risks of uncertain gate receipts, major league baseball clubs will need to play their drawing cards skillfully this year to keep from dipping any further into the red ink.

Only seven of the 16 American and National league organizations showed a profit at the close of 1931. The lopsided character of the two pennant races was largely responsible for the slump in gate receipts but the national game, like every other sport, has felt the pinch of the times.

Player salaries have been reduced and the player limit cut, to bring about a saving estimated at about \$750,000, but it will take additional measures to prevent further financial embarrassment for the magnates. John McGraw, blaming the umpires for too much pacifism, believes the fans will turn out to see the ball players exhibit the scrappy spirit characteristic of McGraw's own playing days. Many old-timers agree with the Giants' leader but it is more likely the clubs will rely on closer pennant races and exploitations of individual stars to stimulate keener interest.

Eugene, Ore., April 1 (AP)—Ernie Nevers, the "greatest football player Pop Warner ever coached," today was added to the list of possible successors to Dr. Clarence W. Spears as head coach of Oregon university.

Bill Reinhart, chief assistant to Dr. Spears, and Prince Callison, freshman coach, already are avowed candidates to take the post resigned by the portly physician when he became mentor of Wisconsin.

Nevers, now assistant to Warner at Stanford, might listen to a proposal from Oregon. His light has been eclipsed by the brilliance of Warner's coaching. But none here deny that his experience as a player and as a coach of professional football have prepared him for bigger jobs.

A cheering report today came from the players who opened spring practice under a crew of assistants. A large number of brawny men from Minnesota and elsewhere who had come to Oregon expressly to play under Dr. Spears said flatly they would remain here instead of trailing him to Madison at the loss of a year's competition.

Jack Heads West After Failing To Kayo Hunt In 4 Round Battle, Detroit

Detroit, April 1 (AP)—The first stage of his come-back campaign at an end, Jack Dempsey was headed westward today for a few weeks of rest on the coast before going into intense training for a final crack at the title he lost six years ago to Gene Tunney.

The former champion's exhibition tour ended here last night when he outpointed, but failed to knock down, Babe Hunt, Ponca City, Okla., heavyweight whose long arms and vicious left hook made him dangerous throughout.

It was not a decisive victory. The Associated Press score card showed the first and third rounds even and gave Dempsey the second and fourth by a shade. There was no official decision.

Dempsey had difficulty getting inside Hunt's defense in the first. In the second, he took two stiff jabs to the face, then rushed Hunt to the ropes with a left and a right, and, utilizing the same combination, had the Oklahoma boy in distress again. They were slugging so furiously at the end that neither heard the bell. In the fourth, Dempsey shrugged off some stiff punches and was chasing Hunt around the ring with vicious chops to the face when the bout ended.

The ex-champion intends to do some intensive mountain climbing at a camp near Reno, Nev., to strengthen his legs and build up his stamina in anticipation of heavy fighting this summer, probably with Primo Carnera and, if his avowed hopes are realized, with Max Schmeling for the title.
