

FARMER UNION LEARNS ABOUT LEGISLATION

Dayton—The regular meeting of the Union local of the farmers' union was held at the Webster grange hall with nearly every seat occupied. Several visitors from other locals and the grange were present. James Richardson announced that the union buyer, Ben Loehring of Lafayette has oil of a high grade which he is selling for much less than it can be bought elsewhere.

Morton Tompkins told of the great pressure brought to bear on legislators by corporations and organizations, while too little support has been given in the past by the average citizen and taxpayer. Dr. Lynn Gubser spoke on economy in government. Clarence Terry reported a high percentage of signs for the abortion trust through this section of the country. William Royle reported progress in the discussion with local doctors as to the plan of special rates for union members in medical attention and hospital fees.

James Richardson reported the first insurance rate for this year to be raised from 25c to 35c. Mr. Swan, representing the Carlton Cooperative Creamery, made a plea for more cream and cited the advantages to the dairyman to be obtained by patronizing his local cooperative organization.

County Agent S. T. White urged farmers to look over their farms carefully and find if it would not be possible to change some crops to others which might prove more profitable. He gave a list of possible changes which might prove beneficial.

President J. J. Muls said the tax league had endorsed Peter Zimmerman for joint senator. It has also endorsed Morton Tompkins for representative and Lynn Gubser for county school superintendent. Morton Tompkins then read a letter, written May 9, 1926 by the late Senator A. M. LaFollette who was known as "the watchdog of the treasury," in which he urged the reelection of Peter Zimmerman as senator at that time.

Mrs. J. Richardson gave a biography of the Oregon poet, Edwin Markham, which was followed by B. A. Peterson's recitation. Refreshments were served.
