

WORK ON TANK IS HELD NEED FOR WOODBURN

Woodburn—Two assessment ordinances were passed at the meeting of the Woodburn city council Tuesday night, one for the gravel improvement of Fifth street from the southerly line of Harrison street to the southerly line of Grant street at a cost of \$174.30 and one for sidewalk construction on Grant street between First and Second.

A petition was presented asking for the vacation of Arthur street between Second and Third streets abutting the property of George D. Keys, Eugene Courtney, Charles L. Agle and J. W. Richards. This was signed by the four property owners interested and also by two-thirds of the property owners within 400 feet of the street under consideration. The petition was laid on the table until next meeting for further investigation by the council. The street in question is unimproved, is a dead end of Arthur street and is used very little. In the event it is vacated the property would revert to the abutting property owners.

The condition of the city water tank was brought up and Water Superintendent E. N. Soule reported that the tank was badly in need of cleaning and painting both inside and out, leaks in the roof need repairing and rods and rivets need to be tightened. A representative of a tower tank company was on hand and gave some figures as to the probable cost of such repairs, which would approximate \$250.

It has been six years since the tank was cleaned and painted and its condition is considered unsatisfactory at the present time. The matter was left in the hands of the water board as it is necessary that some arrangements be made with the Ray Brown cannery for the use of their tank to help supply the city with water while this work is being done and the matter cannot be definitely decided until the Ray-Brown tank is completed.

The cost of compensation insurance was discussed and it was moved that the bill presented be paid according to the old schedule and that a rate in rates be taken under consideration. A hydrant was requested on East Lincoln street near Coppley.

Bills for the month were examined and approved and reports of city officers were accepted and filed.
