

WATER CHANGES ANNOUNCED FOR SILVERTON USE

Silverton—All residents of Silverton received post cards during the week announcing a revised method of standardizing the municipal water rates. This ruling will go into effect May 1.

A service charge will be made on all meters inside the city limits as follows:

1/4 in. meter	\$1.00
1/2 in. meter	1.25
3/4 in. meter	1.50
1 in. meter	2.00
1 1/2 in. meter	2.50
2 in. meter	3.00

In addition all water used will be charged for on the basis of 8 cents per hundred cubic feet for the first 10,000 cubic feet; 4 cents per hundred cubic feet thereafter with a minimum charge of 10 cents for water. Outside the city limits the service will be 25 cents additional and water consumed will be on city basis.

This action has been taken to simplify bookkeeping and remove some discrepancies in the application of rates and usage that have been the outcome of a dual flat rate and meter rate system used heretofore. In general the public will not suffer any rise in rates, the total income being estimated to produce about as formerly. The change is to equitably distribute costs so that each person pays for exactly what he uses. The notice is signed by the Silverton water commission.

RUNAWAY PLOW KILLS FARMER

William—Joe Zowarski was the victim of an accident which caused his death at a hospital a few hours later.

He was operating a tractor, while plowing a field on the farm owned by his father-in-law, Mr. Warnick, when he fell in front of the plow. The tractor continued running and one of the plow points ran through Zowarski's leg near the hip. His call for help attracted neighbors, who hurried to the scene. The tractor ran into a ditch and stopped, leaving an erratic course behind it.

Zowarski was badly mangled when dug from beneath the plow, but was still conscious. He was placed in an auto and hurried to meet the ambulance that had called. The transfer was made near Sheridan. Zowarski died after reaching the hospital. He leaves a widow and two small children.

IRRIGATION ASKED FOR ABBEY ACRES

DALLAS SCHOOL SYSTEM LAUDED FOR EFFICIENCY

Dallas—The local school system, one of the 29 graded as first class in the state, and rated as one of the best in its class for many years, has operated over a long term of years at an extremely low cost.

Comparison with other districts in this particular division reveals the fact that even after these districts had made cuts in their budgets, the Dallas system would still be operating at a lower cost.

The board of directors, who met Wednesday evening, have devoted considerable time to the economic situation and have found it possible to make a substantial reduction in the budget total, amounting to practically ten percent, as compared with a year ago, without materially impairing the efficiency of the system. Salaries in the higher brackets will be cut but the lower brackets will not be affected inasmuch as they are already considerably lower than the average.

Practically all of the present staff of teachers will be re-elected, although the list has not yet been made public. The budget has not been ratified by the committee appointed for the purpose by Dr. A. B. Starbuck, chairman of the board, which consists of Oscar Hayer, R. Turner, Tracy Staats, Walter Muir, Joe Craven and Eric Fulgham. The last three named are not members of the board but were appointed largely in an advisory capacity.

SHERIDAN DISTRICT REPORTED DEBT FREE

Sheridan—Sheridan school district No. 48 has no bonded debt now. The notice of the payment of the last of the bonds due in 1933 was made public last week. This wipes out all bonded debt of the district, according to Homer Parrett, county treasurer of Yamhill county. There are very few districts in the state, according to Parrett, the size of this district, that have no outstanding bonds and the payment at this time is an accomplishment of which the Sheridan district should feel proud.

This statement from Parrett may have an effect on the project for unionization, as several districts looked with distrust upon any such condition existing, believing debts would have to be met and their entrance into a union would mean part assumption of such debts.
