

STATE GRANGE HOUSE LISTING AT SILVERTON

Silverton—Two principal attractions of the Silverton chamber of commerce meeting Wednesday evening were Fred Paulus, deputy state treasurer, Salem, as speaker and the recital in the Silverton high school band. Reports of the work of preparation for the state grange convention beginning June 14, was given. Eighty-eight people were served a banquet at 6:30 o'clock at the Gory, with the members of the high school band and Professor Hal Campbell, director, as special guests of the forum.

Earl Adams, president of the group, was master of ceremonies, and Superintendent Robert Goetz, acting as secretary in the absence of George Hubbs, regular chamber of commerce secretary. Professor Campbell commended the work of the band boys at Corvallis, expressed the appreciation of the city of Silverton for the cooperation and hospitality and related some "behind the scenes" financial struggles in order to make the trip to Corvallis possible.

Appearing on the musical program for the evening were Maurice Winter, trombone solo, aria, "O, The Sublime Sweet Evening Star," with Prof. Campbell accompanying. Winter took second place among the solo contestants of trombone at the Corvallis meet. Other solo numbers with Campbell at the piano were the "Norwegian Cradle Song," Morset, by Erlie Lee, clarinet, and "Schubert's Serenade," trumpet solo, by Billy Kleeb. An interesting fact is that Professor Hal Campbell is the composer of the well known "Norwegian Cradle Song," under the non de plume of "More". He sold the rights many years ago. The entire band were three numbers just outside the banquet hall as closing numbers. A number of Silverton residents who were new to the forum meetings were introduced by Mr. Adams and G. A. Ratcliff, candidate for the nomination of sheriff of Marion county gave a short talk.

Adams introduced Fred Paulus, deputy state treasurer, as one who would explain the ins and outs of the state treasury office. Paulus took as the main theme of his talk the discussion of the "county method" of rearranging the work that had unjustly fallen to the treasury department, among the other divisions of state. As an example, where the treasury division had formerly written 6,000 receipts a year, they now write 12, by placing the responsibility on the county. He told of the plan to the state by the legal permission to borrow from other departments that had a surplus, at the rate of two per cent interest as compared to the former payment to individual firms of six per cent interest. Statistics were given in proof of the county method. The investments of state funds never savor of speculation, a safe percentage of the property value of the investment was a prime consideration. Paulus dealt at length on the bonding of municipalities, and produced comparative figures showing the cost of Silverton, the city of Silverton, and the conditions of Marion county in general, as favorable.

Mayor L. C. Eastman reported in behalf of the housing committee for the Oregon state grange convention to be held in Silverton June 15, 16, and 17, that the house to house canvass would begin this week. Mayor Eastman felt that the canvass was rather early, as did other members of the forum, but certain grange authorities are demanding an early canvass though they have neglected to state the number of visitors, even approximately, that Silverton is to prepare for. At any rate, sufficient housing facilities are being looked after, and the whole affair is systematically organized. Blanks are to be circulated acquiring the information wanted for taking care of the visitors. Other affairs connected with the state grange session are being cared for by smaller committee groups. E. A. Haight, and Dr. C. R. Wilson are the other members serving with Mayor Eastman on the housing committee.
