After she succeeded in clambering through the opening from her rescuing the boy, her real labors began. He was to all appearances dead. She tells that when she was a child in her home land, she had once seen or read of, she cannot recall which, a demonstration of resuscitation from suffocation caused by drowning in which the victim was rolled across the knees of the resper.

This experience, she declares, she had forgotten, until it came to her mind, clearly. She had never tried it herself. She worked as she remembered was the method of procedure for two and one-half hours, calling frantically to passing motorists, but not being heard, and afraid to give up her efforts for a second. Finally, the little boy breathed normally, and on Wednesday morning was showing no ill effect of his experience.

The Slinkard family are Russians. They live at the Ous Carstenson home and Mrs. Slinkard keeps house for Carstenson, and his four children who are all in school. The ranch is one-half mile south of Drake's Crossing on the Silverton-Silver Creek secondary state highway and the house is only a few yards from the road, but no one heard her calls for being heard, and fell in the water about 11 o'clock, and Mrs. Slinkard states it was a little past two when she was sure the little boy would live, and that she was alone until the Carstenson children came home from school. There are just the two children in the Slinkard family.
