POLK REGISTRATION SHOWS BIG INCREASE

Dallas—Voters' registration figures as compiled by the county clerk's office show a total of 7630 registered voters. This is a gain of 771 over the number checked up in 1930 with more than 50 per cent of the increase being credited to the democratic party.

Of the electorate total 4993 are republicans, 2488 are democrats, and 149 are miscellaneous. This is a ratio to approximately two to one, slightly less than it was two years ago when it was 2.31 to 1. In the towns of Dallas and Independence the ratio is reported to be less than two to one.

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POLK HIGHWAY FUND INCREASE SEEN FOR YEAR

Dallas—The roads taken over by the state in 1931 and which have been made a part of the state's secondary highway system will have a total of \$22,615 spent in their improvement, repair and general upkeep this year, according to plans which have received the approval of the county court. This amount is a little below what it was estimated would be spent but at the same time is a considerable increase over the amount that was spent last year on the same roads, a sum of \$17,715.50.

The Wallace road, running from West Salem to the Yamhill county line, a distance of 9.8 miles will have the sum of \$5,850 expended on it in patching, ditching, new gravel and oiling.

The Kings Valley road which leaves the Pacific highway south of Monmouth and extends in a south westerly direction to the Benton county line, a distance of 15.7 miles has been allocated the sum of \$3,400 with the bulk of the money to be expended for maintenance purposes.

From Dallas to Lewisville, a stretch of 9.7 miles, \$4,910 will be used for graveling, reolling and maintenance.

The Dallas coast route, the road running in a north westerly direction from here to and connecting with the state highway south of Willamina, a distance of 15.7 miles will be improved mostly by graveling and oiling at a cost of \$7,905. \$1,350 will be spent in reolling and patching the section of road between Brunk's corner and Independence.

The work will be done under the supervision of the state but by county workers under the direction of the county engineer.

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Logging Road Work Will Bring Timber To Mill City Mill

Mill City—Work on the construction of the road bed for the new logging road above Mill City on the Marion county side of the river was completed and the work of graveling the roadbed will not be done until the sun has had a chance to dry up the excess moisture and the bed to settle. The timber is owned by the Hammond lumber company, under whose orders the road was built.
