

LINDY VIEWS BODY OF DEAD BABE

COSHOW SAYS TRANSACTIONS IN GOOD FAITH

Defendant in Empire Case
Didn't Know Other Di-
rectors Gave Notes

Case Not Expected To Be
Completed Until Late
Saturday

Dallas, Ore., May 13 (AP)—Judge Oliver P. Coshaw occupied the witness stand under cross examination by the special prosecuting attorney, Barney Goldstein, for the morning session of the Empire Holding corporation trial being conducted in circuit court here. The afternoon session was expected to be taken up by further examination of Judge Coshaw, one of the holding company's directors now on trial with intent to devise a scheme to defraud, and by one or two rebuttal witnesses. It was not expected that the case would go to the jury until tomorrow, since both the prosecuting and defense attorneys will make closing pleas after the witnesses are dismissed.

HOOVER RELIEF PLAN STUDIED

Washington, May 13 (AP)—Senate democrats turned the Hoover relief plan over to the special committee for study today.

A second conference of the democrats failed to develop an absolute approval of the compromise. The special committee was determined upon to go over the plan. Senator Robinson, democratic leader, whose conference with President Hoover opened the way for a compromise, will serve as a member.

Other members are Wagner of New York, Walsh of Montana, Pittman of Nevada, and Buckley of Ohio.

As a result of last night's conference at the White House between the president and republicans of the senate banking committee, republican leaders were confident of a general agreement in their ranks on the proposal to extend federal aid to the states for unemployment relief and to finance public and private construction by means of the reconstruction corporation.

RECORDS OF SISTERS CHECKED FOR CLUES

Pittsburgh, May 13 (AP)—City detectives, on request of New Jersey state police, today began checking court records of two sisters employed as domestics and arrested here in 1929.

The New Jersey authorities did not say whether the information was wanted in connection with the hunt for the killers of Charles A. Lindbergh, Jr. The detectives said, however, the request came from an official who went abroad in the Lindbergh kidnapping investigation.

The telegram to Pittsburgh officers said the sisters were named "either Tinko or Tino."

Major Charles Schoeffel, assistant superintendent of the New Jersey state police, went to England and Scotland in connection with the Lindbergh case.

SEEK LEADER FOR LINDY MANHUNT

Trenton, N. J., May 13 (AP)—New Jersey authorities in conference today to decide upon a unified plan and to select a head for their search for the kidnappers and slayers of Charles Augustus Lindbergh, Jr. adjourned without coming to an agreement.

The officials will meet again Monday. Meanwhile the investigation will be continued by state police and the detectives assigned from the police forces of Newark, Jersey City and Trenton. The governor, who did not attend today's conference, will preside Monday.

Attorney General William A. Stevens, who presided at today's conference, refused to discuss what had taken place.

He said he was anxious to have the prosecutors of Mercer and Hudson counties and police officials agree upon one man who would be in charge of the investigation.

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Autopsy Report On Lindy Baby Shows Blows Fractured Skull

Trenton, N. J., May 13 (AP)—The report of Dr. Charles H. Mitchell, county physician, who performed an autopsy on the body of the Lindbergh baby, follows: "Report on an unidentified child, three months' time depending on climate and other conditions that might produce such results."

"Special characteristics: Unusually high and prominent forehead and cranium, apparently greater in circumference than would be found in a child this age. The first toe of the right foot completely overlaps the big toe. There are eight upper and lower teeth. The upper incisors are well formed, rather prominent, but do not protrude. The two lower canines tend to divert toward the incisors and are below

FLIER WINGING WAY TO PARIS OVER ATLANTIC

Lou Reichers, American
Aviator Speeding from
Newark, Harbor Grace

Behind Time and Breaks
Stabilizer of Plane in
Landing

Harve, France, May 13 (AP)—A government signal station picked up tonight a message from the steamship City of Hamburg stating officers had sighted a plane they believed to be Lou Reichers' over the island of Ushant, about 20 miles west of the French coast.

Harbor Grace, N. F., May 13 (AP)—Lou Reichers, American aviator speeding from Newark, N. J., for Paris on a two-stop flight in which he hoped to better the time of Col. Charles A. Lindbergh, reached Harbor Grace this morning and took off again for Dublin, Ireland.

Reichers headed his plane out over the Atlantic, the most dangerous leg of his flight, at 5:31 a. m. EST. Observers at Harbor Grace said the weather was favorable.

The Arlington, N. J., speed flier, who started from Newark at 10:32 o'clock last night, landed at Harbor Grace at 5:25 a. m., less than six and one-half hours later.

He effected repairs quickly, however, then filled the fuel tanks of the plane until they held 550 gallons of gasoline and headed out toward the open sea. It was broad daylight, for the take-off was at 7 a. m. (Continued on page 11, column 7)

GUERRILLA FIGHT EXPECTED TODAY

Changchun, May 13 (AP)—A general engagement between Japanese and Manchukuo troops with bands of guerrillas on widely separated fronts, was expected today following receipt of reports of preliminary skirmishes.

A Japanese column reportedly clashed with a band of 500 guerrillas, while Manchukuo troops were said to be advancing on a similar force of guerrillas west of Yuliangpo.

Near Changchun, three columns of Japanese and Manchukuo troops, including 5300 infantry, 1500 cavalry, and reserves, were said to be advancing on 12,000 guerrillas under Li Hai-Ching. It was understood the guerrillas were being circled by the other troops and given the alternative of surrender or annihilation.

NOT GUILTY PLEA ENTERED BY MEANS

Washington, May 13 (AP)—Gaston B. Means pleaded not guilty to two indictments charging larceny, trust and embezzlement in connection with \$100,000 he allegedly obtained from Mrs. Evelyn Walsh McLean to effect the return of the Lindbergh baby.

J. William Tomlinson, Means' counsel, told Justice Proctor he would want to change the plea and the court gave him until next Tuesday to study the indictments. Proctor will rule on a date for the trial at that time.

Means was in court, chewing gum and smiling.

BONUS ADVOCATES URGE FIAT MONEY

Washington, May 13 (AP)—Ten members of the ways and means committee told the house today in a minority report on the Palmer bill for redeeming the soldiers' bonus certificates by the issuance of new money that the greatest need of the country was for more money in circulation.

The report, favoring the cash payment plan which was rejected by committee majority, was signed by Representatives Ragon of Arkansas, Canfield of Indiana, McCormack of Massachusetts, Vinson of Kentucky, Hill of Washington, Cullen and Sullivan of New York, Dickinson of Missouri, Ellis of Tennessee and Sanders of Texas, all democrats.

"More money in circulation is needed and the payment of adjusted service certificates would supply that need by distributing \$2,000,000,000 more of actual money throughout every part of the country," it said.

Diaper Pins Among Clues Given Jafsie

Trenton, N. J., May 13 (AP)—The Trenton Times today said Prosecutor Erwin E. Marshall, in a conference last night with Dr. John F. Condon and Dr. Lindbergh, was informed the sleeping suit missing from the Lindbergh baby's body had been turned over to him in the negotiations which resulted in payment of \$50,000 ransom money.

The sleeping suit, Dr. Condon said, is in the possession of Col. Lindbergh.

Two other bits of evidence supposedly establishing the authenticity of the alleged kidnapping group that dealt with Dr. Condon, also are in the possession of Col. Lindbergh, the paper said. Dr. Condon told the prosecutor they are two diaper pins. A diaper which the baby wore when it was kidnapped is missing.

Dr. Condon told Prosecutor Marshall, the Times said, that early in the negotiations with the supposed kidnappers the diaper pins (Continued on page 10, column 4)

STARR STATES BOARD'S STAND

Portland, May 13 (AP)—The state board of higher education has never considered anything but an outside chancellor of the higher education institutions of Oregon, Chairman C. L. Starr of the board said today.

Starr said that the attitude of the board had been for several months that an outside man should be chosen, and that neither Dr. Arnold Bennett, Hall of the university, nor Dr. W. J. Kerr of the college, aspired to the position.

The chairman said he felt sure that the recent boom for Dr. Kerr was without the latter's knowledge or consent, and that it has probably proved embarrassing to Kerr.

Eugene, May 13 (AP)—The student parliament of University of Oregon stood today for an out-state man for chancellor of higher education. The parliament, meeting in Guild hall, unanimously adopted a resolution favoring the selection of a man not now connected with any Oregon institution, holding that the presidents of the university and college had been in the thick of rivalry between the schools and that it would be unfair to the other school if either were chosen.

EX-KING ATTACKED ON PIER AT MALTA

Marseilles, France, May 13 (AP)—Former King Alfonso of Spain stepped off a steamer from Malta today into a rain of blows from a roughly dressed man on the pier.

The incident was so unexpected that the man punched the former monarch several times about the head and body before anybody could stop him. He was arrested immediately and identified as a Spaniard.

His name is Gonzales Macanarez. Alfonso and his son, Don Juan, were walking together through a shed and were kept away from the gangplank to their car when Macanarez leaped upon the king and, without saying a word, struck him in the face.

A policeman was not far off but the man got in several other blows before he was dragged off.

Alfonso stood for a moment in astonishment, then walked quickly to his car and was driven away. Last March when Alfonso passed through here on the way to Paris from San Remo a young Spaniard at the curb shouted insults at him until the police hustled him off. Alfonso ignored the incident and the offender was released.

MRS. BROOKS AMONG GUESTS OF HONOR

London, May 13 (AP)—Nine American women were among the 400 debutantes presented at the second court of the season last night at Buckingham palace.

The king and queen again led the brilliant procession to the ball room. The Prince of Wales, who was in Paris for the funeral of President Doumer when the first court was held, was among the members of the royal family grouped behind their majesties.

Ambassador Andrew W. Mellon appeared again in formal evening dress instead of in the silk knee breeches usually worn at court.

Among those presented was Mrs. Russell M. Brooks, Saltan, Ore.

HOOVER PUTS AGENCIES ON MURDER TRAIL

President Orders Secret
Service To Press Hunt
For Lindy Babe Killers

Search Not To Be Re-
laxed Until Criminals
Brought To Justice

Washington, May 13 (AP)—President Hoover today directed the law enforcement agencies and secret service of the federal government to set out upon a hunt for the murderers of the Lindbergh baby, "never to be relaxed until those criminals are implacably brought to justice."

The president, employing strong language, directed the federal police authorities "to make the kidnapping and murder of the Lindbergh baby a live and never to be forgotten case."

The federal government does not have direct police authority in the present case, he pointed out, despite its brutality and the nationwide horror it has caused, but federal agencies will be "unusually alert" to bring the murderers to punishment.

The president issued the following statement: "I have directed the law enforcement agencies and the secret service of the federal government (Continued on page 11, column 5)

AKRON SHORT OF HELIUM GAS

Sunnyvale, May 13 (AP)—Confronted with the necessity of valving out more of the ship's helium supply in order to make a landing, Commander C. E. Rosendahl of the dirigible Akron, chose to cruise over this far west naval air base today awaiting more favorable atmospheric conditions before tying up at the mooring mast.

A message dropped by Commander Rosendahl said it was necessary to conserve his helium supply for further operations, indicating previously announced maneuvers with the United States fleet, now at sea, will be carried out.

It will be necessary to tie up to get aboard more helium for the maneuvers, as well as more gasoline for the ship's eight motors.

Commander Rosendahl's last message, dropped before cruising away toward San Francisco, said: "Due to light and variable winds the Akron cannot land without valving helium which is necessary to conserve for further operations. The ship will stand by for possible satisfactory conditions and in case there is no improvement, will fly until sunset."

The Akron moved leisurely up the peninsula to San Francisco, where it gave the city a non-hour thrill, cruising over the business and residential districts.

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ANNE BEARING UP WELL UNDER STRAIN

Princeton, N. J., May 13 (AP)—Dr. John C. Hibben, president of Princeton university and close friend of Mrs. Lindbergh, said today that Mrs. Lindbergh, although overwhelmed with grief, was "bearing up just as she has all along."

Dr. Hibben has been to the Lindbergh home many times since the baby was stolen and was one of those who offered to act as intermediary if the kidnappers were afraid to deal directly with Col. Lindbergh. He said he might visit the Lindbergh home today.

McMahan Planning Instruction Of Jury Investigating Him

Public speculation as to whether Judge L. H. McMahan, of department No. 1 of the Marion county circuit court, proposes to officiate as instructing judge when and if the Marion county grand jury undertakes the investigation of Judge McMahan's conduct of his court, as requested by the county

court, was put at rest with the statement of Judge McMahan that he sees no reason why, even though his official conduct is under investigation, another judge should be called in to instruct and direct the grand jury.

Action on the inquiry requested of the grand jury by the county court is marking time pending a decision by Governor Meier on the appointment of a special prosecutor to assist the jury in conducting its investigations. Governor Meier has referred the matter to the attorney general.

FINDERS POSE FOR PICTURES

Hopewell, N. J., May 13 (AP)—Two men whose discovery gave to the world the fate of the kidnapped Lindbergh baby reported for work as usual at 7 a. m. today at the home of W. S. Titus. They were visibly embarrassed when they entered the Titus yard at Marshall Corner, three miles from Hopewell, to find the back yard a setting for newswall cameras and sound reproducing apparatus.

William Allen, of Trenton, a slight negro of 43 years, who was the first to see the body of the baby at the edge of the wood yesterday afternoon, posed in his work clothes for pictures and the "talkies." He repeated his version of the finding of the body three or four times.

Then his companion, Orville Wilson, 40 year old man with grey hair, took his turn.

"Of course I didn't tarry there very long," he said, "and you know you wouldn't be sure afterward."

He said that when Allen made the discovery he called simply, "Come on over here." When they were sure they had found the body of a baby they drove to Hopewell to inform police.

State troopers today guarded the spot where the body was found and permitted no one to approach it.

ASK HOOVER FOR SILVER PARLEY

Washington, May 13 (AP)—The house coinage committee agreed unanimously today to recommend that President Hoover call an international conference to discuss silver and monetary exchanges.

The committee's preliminary report after an investigation ordered by the house will be submitted to the president tomorrow along with a resolution asking and authorizing the president to invite interested countries to participate in the conference.

The resolution suggests that the meeting discuss adjustment of national currencies to the gold standard, methods of correcting the dislocation of international trade and international exchange, a re-evaluation of silver wherever it is used as money or in monetary reserves; raising commodity prices to levels "sufficiently high to restore normal bases of economic relations."

Body Of Baby Found By Negro Truckman In Sourlands Brush

Hopewell, N. J., May 13 (AP)—The Lindbergh baby is dead; murdered, brutally. They found the body—it was hardly more than a skeleton—late yesterday afternoon. A negro truckman, pushing his way through thick brush of the Sourlands—about five miles from the Charles A. Lindbergh estate—made the discovery.

Police were called. Identification was confirmed. A baby hunt, cautious and painstaking, was ended; a man hunt, wideflung and intense, swept forward in its place.

Discovery of the child's skeleton was made by William Allen, negro truckman. In his truck, driving the Hopewell-Mount Rose highway, he had halted, and left it to enter the woods.

CREMATION OF BODY PLANNED BY LINDBERGH

Flier Makes Identification
At Mortuary on Sudden
Impulse

Both Jafsie and Curtis
Dealt With Kidnapers
Police Believe

Linden, N. J., May 13 (AP)—The body of Charles A. Lindbergh Jr., arrived here late today for cremation. The hearse was followed by an automobile carrying Col. Charles A. Lindbergh.

Trenton, N. J., May 13 (AP)—Colonel Charles A. Lindbergh, apparently acting on an impulse, viewed the body of his kidnapped son at a morgue before the infant was removed for cremation today and satisfied himself beyond question of its identification.

Colonel Lindbergh left the morgue at 4:30 after remaining more than half an hour inside. He got in his car and drove to his home. His expression was sober and he seemed weary. Colonel Henry Breckenridge drove the car. As it swung out into the street, a crowd broke the police lines and followed.

Hundreds of children ran several blocks, and many adults too, to see which way the Lindbergh car was going.

Some minutes before Colonel Lindbergh emerged from the (Continued on page 10, column 5)

ACQUITTAL OF BAKER ORDERED

Portland, May 13 (AP)—A directed verdict of acquittal was ordered today in the case of Mayor George L. Baker and four other defendants on trial in circuit court here on malfeasance charges. They were accused of having agreed to pay \$200,000 too much for a municipal market site.

The other defendants on trial with Mayor Baker were City Commissioners John M. Mann and Earl Riley, accused with him of malfeasance, and O. Laungard, city engineer, and C. Lee Wilson, contractor, indicted as accessories.

The arguments for and against the directed verdict of acquittal lasted two and a half days. The jury was excluded during these arguments.

The trial opened 12 days ago. Judge Robert Tucker explained in handing down the decision that he would be derelict in his duties if he declined to grant the motion for acquittal and had submitted the case to the jury.

LEAPS 13 STORIES TO DEATH IN STREET

Portland, Ore., May 13 (AP)—Miss Marjorie Kaufman, 13, was killed today when she leaped from the sixth floor of a downtown department store.

Employees of the store said they observed her for 30 minutes prior to the plunge in a dejected attitude at a table. Suddenly, after a fit of weeping, she dashed to the open window.

Mrs. M. J. Braden and Mrs. F. H. Asbury, both of Los Angeles, were knocked down by the falling woman plunger. Neither was injured.

LINDBERGH'S MOTHER ENROUTE TO JERSEY

Detroit, May 13 (AP)—Mrs. Charles A. Lindbergh, Sr., mother of Col. Charles A. Lindbergh, was enroute today to New Jersey to join her son and daughter-in-law at their Sourlands mountain home.

For the first time since the kidnapping of the Lindbergh baby March 1, Mrs. Lindbergh did not appear at the Cass Technical high school to meet her classes in chemistry. Informed of the discovery of the baby's body, apparently by the phone conversation last night from the Hopewell estate of her son, she refused to make any comment.

She boarded a train today after arranging for a substitute teacher to take over her classes. Her associates said she requested that no one talk to her about the baby.
