Distance Record

Set by Sea Gulls
Vibry, Gothland, Sweden (AP)—A long distance flying record of 1,739 miles has been set by a Swedish gull, bearing an identification tag marked 15,181-C of the Swedish Museum of Natural History. The bird was one of 430 so-called "laughing gulls" tagged by museum officials in June, 1929, on the island of Rone Ytterholme, off Gothland. It was Louis du Senegal, in French West Africa.

American-Canadian Border 5500 Miles

Albany, Vt. (AP)—In both Canada and the United States there are frequent references to "the 4,000 miles of undefended boundary" between the two countries. Actually, the border line, on which Albany is located is 5,500 miles long, of which 3,100 miles are of land boundary and 2,400 miles are water boundary. The land boundary is marked by 5,483 monuments and the water boundary is identified by 2,330 reference marks.

MISSIONS BREAK LOSING STREAK, BEAVERS BEATEN

The Missions have broken an eight game losing streak today, while Oakland, which ended a streak of seven losses Wednesday, had its second straight victory over the league leading San Francisco Seals.

By a score of 4-2 the Missions, under a new manager, Fred Hoffmann, downed Portland late night. It was the first victory of the season for Bert Cole, Mission southpaw. The Reds brought in two runs in the eighth mainly on the wildness of Zahner, Portland pitcher. Hoffmann, veteran catcher, replaced Joe Devine who was removed by Joe Bearwald, president of the Missions. Bearwald said Devine had failed to produce satisfactory results with the material on hand. Devine was instructed to report as scout to Albuquerque of the Arizona-Texas league. The Albuquerque club is used as a Mission farm.

Oakland by some timely hitting downed the Seals 10-1. Ray Brubaker, veteran Oak, drove in three of the first five runs with a single and a triple. Pete Daglia, Oakland pitcher, held the Seals to four hits in turning in his sixth seasonal victory.

Hollywood made it three straight over Sacramento last night as Frank Schellenbach came out best in a hurlers' duel with Tony Freitas of the Senators. The score was 6-2. The Stars got to Freitas for five runs in the sixth, breaking a scoreless deadlock. Schellenbach proved almost hitless when the Senators had men on bases.

Seattle fans can thank Pitcher "Unc" Walters for the Indians' 5-4 victory over Los Angeles last night. After two were out in the ninth inning Walters banged a homer with one man on, giving the Indians a winning margin and a two-one edge in the present series.

Boston Braves Champion Demoralizers, Opponents Commit Many Errors

Bill McKechnie's Boston Braves may not win the National league flag this year, but they promise to establish a lasting record for demoralizing the opposition. In 22 games the battling Bostonians have been helped along by 48 opponents' errors.

The Giants have suffered most from the jinx. In six engagements with the Braves they committed 17 bobbles, eight in one afternoon and five another. Brooklyn made 10 in five games, Philadelphia seven in five.

Now come the league leading Chicago Cubs with a threat to surpass anything previously done. Facing Boston for the first time yesterday, they managed to compile seven errors, more than sufficient to give the Braves an 8 to 3 victory behind Ed Brandt.

The Cubs' young infielders, Bill Herman and Bill Jurgens, divided most of the hard luck between them, Herman with four bobbles and Jurgens with two.

Brandt had the Cubs baffled until the last of the ninth, when Johnny More nicked him for a homerun with two on. The loss cut Chicago's lead over the Braves to two games.

The Brooklyn Dodgers won first blood in their long-awaited series with Cincinnati, 5 to 2, as Babe Phelps hurled scoreless ball after the first inning. Joe Stripp and Tony Cucunello, former Reds, played a big part in the victory.

Jess Haines made his initial start of the year for the St. Louis Cardinals and beat the Phillies, 8 to 2. The Cards knocked Jim Elliott from the hill in the second and plastered his three successors.

The Giants opener at Pittsburgh was rained out, and only one American league engagement escaped the elements. Cleveland nosed out the Boston Red Sox, 5 to 4, when Dick Porter's double scored Cissel after two were out in the ninth. Earl Webb lost the ball in the sun.

jump and by the freshmen in several of the events.

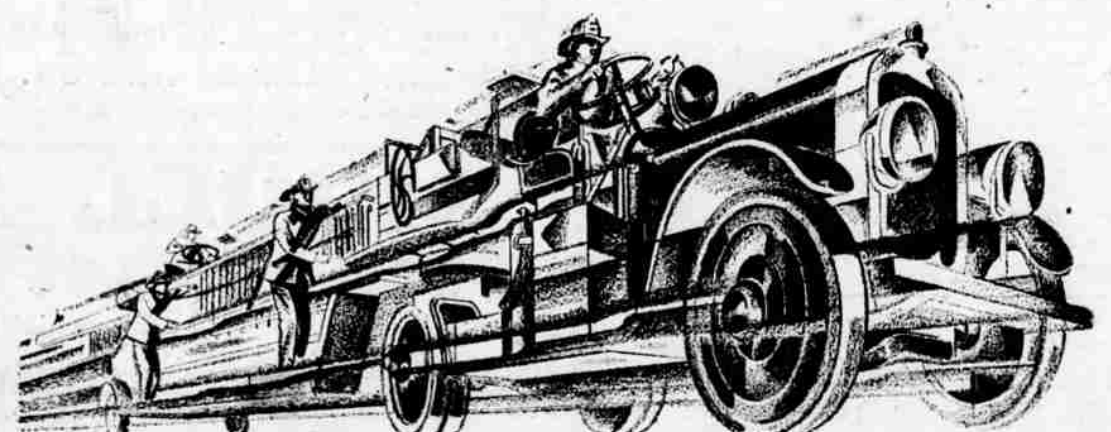
The track will probably be faster for Saturday's meet and better time is expected.
