HAWLEY BILL TO BE POSTPONED

Washington, May 21 (AP)—The prediction that the Hawley bill to raise the tariff to meet depreciated currency of foreign countries would not come before congress for action this session was made today by Representative Rainey, the demagogue leader.

Rainey, a member of the ways and means committee that has the measure under consideration, said that "retaliatory measures would be taken by foreign governments immediately as indicated by protests already received from South America."

"With the treasury department, the tariff commission and a majority of the ways and means committee against the measure, I don't see how it can get approval," he added.

Extensive hearings have been held on the measure, introduced by Representative Hawley of Oregon, co-author of the Hawley-Smoot tariff act.

DO-X HOPS OFF ON OCEAN FLIGHT

New York, May 21 (AP)—The radio Marine corporation announced the receipt at 9:50 a. m. E. S. T. today, of this message from the German airliner Do-X:

"Position: 14-00 Greenwich meridian (9 a. m. E. S. T.) 44.00 north, 41.5 west. Winds west southwest. Speed 90 knots. All clear."

The position given by the Do-X is approximately 500 miles east, southeast of Cape Race, N. F.

Radio-marine attaches interpreted the phrase, "all clear," to mean that that flight was proceeding smoothly.

The Do-X took off from Holyrood for a trans-Atlantic flight to the Azores at 3 a. m. E. S. T. today.

BRAND GIVEN BIG HOME VOTE

Marshfield, Ore., May 21 (AP)—In a record vote today Coos county was piling up a tremendous vote of confidence for James W. Brand, candidate for position number two on the Oregon supreme court.

In complete returns from 50 of Coos county's 60 precincts the standings were: Brand, 4,107; Bean, 437; McCulloch, 285; Hewitt, 231.

For republican president France was leading Hoover 1,015 to 263. For republican senator Stewer held a good lead of 1,512 against Clark with 584, Duncan with 117, Harlan 231, and Stanfield 738.

Hawley maintained a lead of 500 votes over James W. Mott. Figures were: Hawley 1,563, Mott 184, Hulse 469, Mott 1,901.

Hoos had 2,238 to Palmiter's 846. Holman polled 2,090 to Scherping's 846.

Bronaugh had 825 to Van Winkle's 2,049.

For democratic president Roosevelt was leading with 1,993, Murray 307, Smith 11.

Dana was trailing for the nomination for democratic senator with 331, with Gleason having 513 and Watkins 419.

Delzell was but little behind Star-weather. Delzell had 597 and Stark-weather 606.

NARROW ESCAPE FOR BEAR HUNTER

Banff, Alberta, May 21 (AP)—John Cudahy, big game hunter of Milwaukee, Wis., had a narrow escape from death today while hunting grizzlies in the Rockies.

Accompanied by James Boyce, a British gunner, Cudahy came upon a grizzly which he wounded three times only to have the maddened animal rush him.

The bear was almost beside him, raised on its hind legs when a shot from Cudahy's rifle ended its life. The animal was eight feet long from head to tail and had claws 3 1/2 inches long.
