WOODBURN CLINIC IS GIVEN TUESDAY

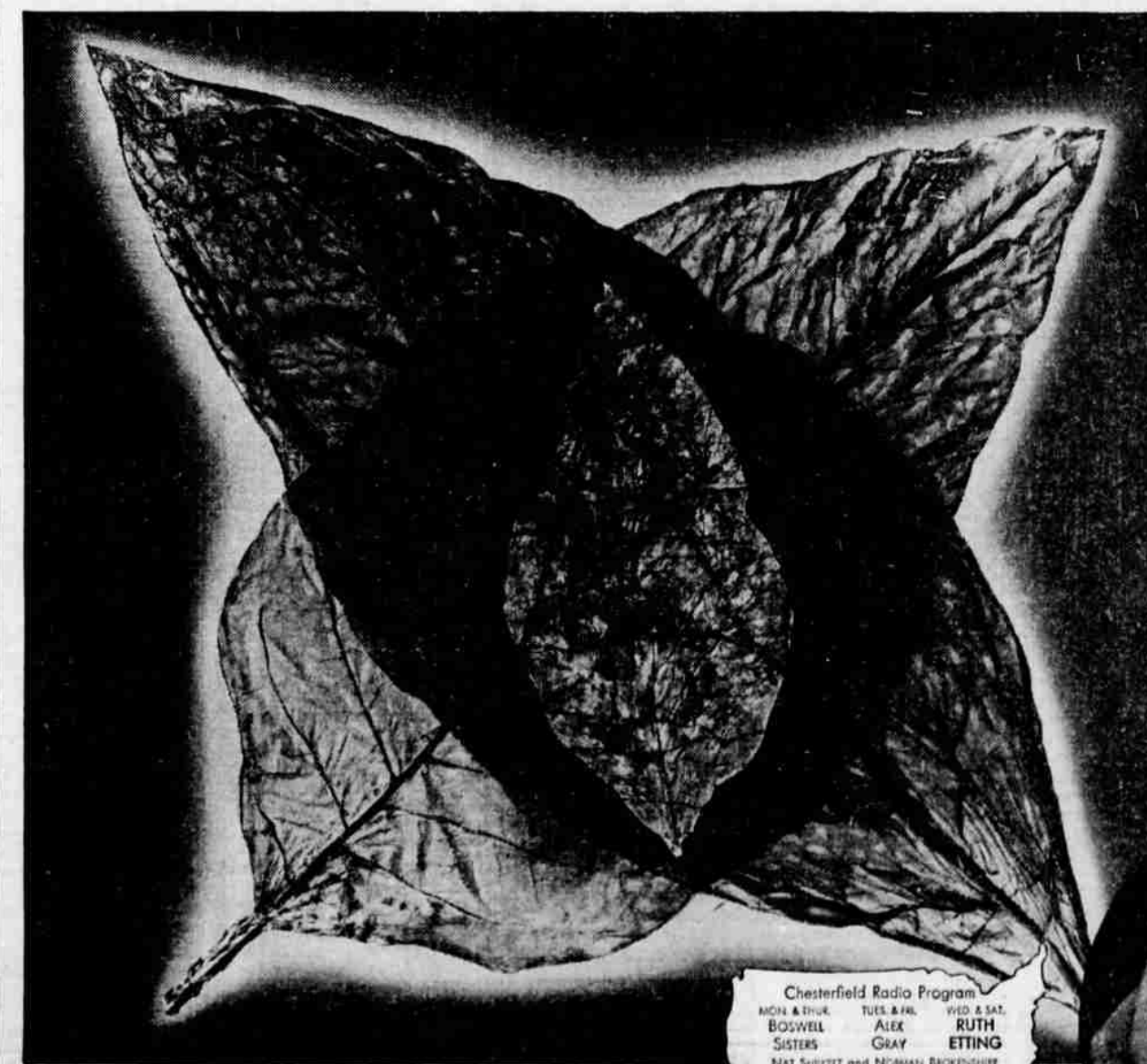
