

81 SILVERTON HIGH STUDENTS ARE GRADUATED

Silverton—Miss Mae Coffey and Steven Stayer were the outstanding members of Silverton's high school graduating class chosen to have their names engraved on the plaque that hangs in the senior high school auditorium. Dean J. R. Jewell gave the commencement address. Miss Catherine C. Coshaw and Ted Gilbert were visiting vocalists, and the school band and orchestra appeared in several instrumental selections at the formal commencement exercises held Thursday evening in the Eugene Field auditorium.

Eighty-one graduates were the formal cap and gown. Miss Lou Ann Chase was class advisor. Robert Goetz, superintendent of Silverton schools, presented the diplomas and Albert M. Davis, principal of the senior high school, acknowledged the honor pupils. More than 2600 people were present with the halls adjacent to the large auditorium and balconies packed with those standing and many went away unable to find even standing room. Rev. Carl L. Foss, pastor of the Silverton Trinity Lutheran church, gave the invocation.

Dean Jewell talked on "Success: Yesterday and Today." Both Miss Coshaw and Mr. Gilbert were warmly encouraged and generously responded with a second number. Miss Coshaw was accompanied by Miss Thelma Peterson, and Gilbert by Miss Mildred Glann. The group are from Oregon State college at Corvallis. Band and orchestra numbers directed by Hal Campbell included: "March," "Silverton School Band," composed by Mr. Campbell; "overture," "The Enchantress," "Victory March," "Victory Favorites," "Herbert," march for graduates, "Pomp and Circumstance," "Elegiac," and march, "Graduation Day," Paine.

On the bronze plaque are only two other names, Frances Stewart and Donald Burch, whose accomplishments of last school year's work gained them the right. The idea had its inception last year and has been an incentive to the graduating class members to strive to do better work in the lines of scholarship, grades averaging 85 and above, three years' attendance, leadership and character. Six pupils were eligible from the selections of the instructors, and the final decision giving Miss Coffey and Stayer the special honor was voted by the high school student body.

Superintendent Goetz reviewed the progress of the Silverton school within the past 12 years. He talked briefly of outstanding work of the class group and of individuals, and made special mention of the valedictorian, Miss Alice Barkhurst and salutatorian, Miss Martha Goodknecht. Lorene Ruiter was class president and Don Lehman president of the student body.
