

TORVEND MAKES GOOD SHOWING WITH JUBILEE

Silverton—Palmer Torvend, third year pupil in the vocational agricultural department of the Silverton High School, won four places at the exhibition of Jerseys, Friday, at the session of the Marion County Jersey club as a part of the Oregon Jersey Jubilee staged at the state fair grounds.

Torvend is one of the outstanding members of the Silverton chapter of Future Farmers of America, being secretary of the organization. He is one of the three Silverton boys holding the State Farmer's degree, the other two are Eldon Fox and James Neal. This degree was conferred upon Torvend during last year's state convention at Corvallis. As a part of Torvend's high school project, he is building up quite an enviable place among other pupils as well as adult breeders in procuring his cattle from the best registered stock. He retains from four to six special head for his school project. Other school projects that Torvend carries are corn, hogs, sheep and poultry. He is one of the Silverton group who are this year introducing some of the Green Giant field corn from the Newberg chapter of Future Farmers of America. Seven other Silverton youths are experimenting with the Newberg production.

Torvend is a prominent promoter of the Svine Breeds' Silverton F. F. A. association that was lately organized. Twenty-five other ribbons were brought home to Silverton, many of them blue, with M. G. Gunderson leading with 14. Fred Gordon and Samuel Torvend each three, Silas Torvend and O. E. Beatty two each, and Donald Schacht one.

Palmer Torvend won sixth on unnamed senior heifer calf; second on two-year-old cow, Darling Girl's Peggy; third on under one year, unnamed; and first on over a year, Darling Girl's Peggy. These animals are all a portion of his high school project.

- Class 1: Perennial—One kind to a vase, each vase to contain five sprays, stems or heads. Prunella, geranium, lupine, or any other perennial which may be in bloom.
- Class 2: Annual and Biennial—One kind to a vase, each vase to contain five sprays, stems or heads. Petunia, geranium, lupine, or any other annual or biennial which may be in bloom.
- Class 3: Delphinium—Best single stalk, best double stalk, three different shades in one container.
- Class 4: Aquilegia—One sprigged container—best display of five stalks, best basket Columbian.
- Class 5: Ranunculus—Best collection of perennials in one garden.
- Class 6: Rose—Best named rose in garden, best collection of roses, best display of five different named varieties in one container.
- Class 7: Rose Plants—Best display of named rose plants.
- Class 8: Water Lily—Best single blossom, best collection of not less than three blossoms.
- Class 9: Iris—Best display of Spanish or Dutch iris, five blossoms in one container, all named colors.
- Class 10: Mixed Bouquet—Any kind of flowers, any size.
- Class 11: Wild Flowers—Camp fire girls only. All flowers must be named.
- Class 12: Sweet Peas—Best mix or more blossoms in one container, mixed or all one color.
