

SALEM JUNIORS DEFEAT SILVERTON BY SCORE 9-5

SERDOTZ HURLS EXCELLENT BALL SCATTERS HITS

The Salem American Legion junior baseball team stood at the top of the heap Monday as the result of a victory over Silvertown and Saturday. The team was beaten 8 to 3 while Silvertown was turned back 9 to 5 at Olinfield field Sunday afternoon.

Serdotz pitched an excellent game for Coach Hawk's youngsters and really deserved a shut out although Silvertown touched him for three hits and four runs in the seventh. He came back strong in the next frame to strike out three men in a row.

Matters looked tough for Salem in the first inning when Silvertown filled the bases with but one out. Harris, however, relieved the situation when Scott lined to him, thus enabling him to turn in a double play.

The visitors were held scoreless until the sixth inning when an infield error and a triple accounted for one run. In the seventh the first man up for Silvertown went out at first. The next one walked and Fluke singled. Marson struck out but Pettijohn got first on an error. Then Asboe and Gorbett singled to drive in four runs.

The local juniors made their first count, scoring two runs in the first, four in the third and three in the eighth.

Portland's Ducks are tied with Hollywood for leadership of the Pacific Coast league today, following yesterday's whirlwind finish of the series with Oakland. The Ducks won the Sunday games, 4 to 0 and 3 to 0, to make it six out of seven for the series, and 16 victories in the last 18 games played. In the second game Oakland out hit Portland 9 to 3, but "Big Boy" Peterson kept the Oaks' singles scattered enough to prevent scoring.

Seattle also upheld the honor of the northwest by taking both ends of a Sunday doubleheader from Sacramento, to win the series six games to one. The victories put Seattle in sixth place in the league standings and forced Sacramento down to seventh. In the first game the Indians were trailing 3 to 6 in the seventh inning when Junke Walters, pitching blitzer, opened the flood gates by knocking out a double. Eleven Seattle runs crossed the plate before the inning ended, the final score being 15 to 7.

Lefty Page, Seattle pitcher, held the Senators to seven hits in the second game, while his teammates staged a four-run rally in the second inning. The game ended 13-4.

The Seals and Angels split their Sunday doubleheader, which gave the series to San Francisco, four to two, one having been rained out. Each team got 16 hits in the opener, which Los Angeles won, 15 to 13.

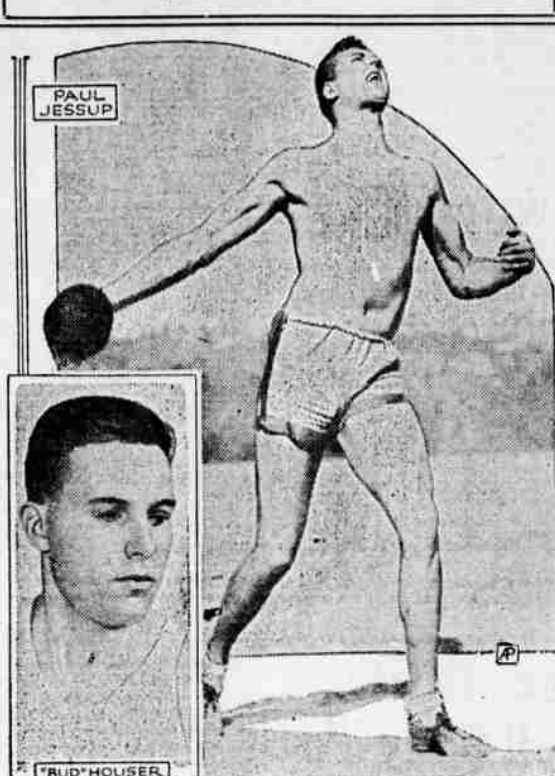

Terry Gang Get Double Shellacking At Hands Of Boston Braves Sunday

New York, June 6 (UP)—Bill Terry, nursing a sore leg and smarting under his first setback as manager of the New York Giants, took advantage of today's respite in the league scheduled to plan a defensive campaign against the powerful western invasion which opens at the Polo grounds tomorrow.

In sharp contrast to his imposing debut Saturday, Memphis Bill's new regime received an unholly shellacking at Boston yesterday when the Braves downed the Giants twice, 6 to 5, and 7 to 6. Bill himself was carried off the field in the first inning of the nightcap when he pulled a muscle in the calf of his left leg while beating out a hit to first base.

These two defeats tumbled the Giants back into the cellar again. The St. Louis Cardinals took both ends of a twin bill from the Cincinnati Reds, 3-2 and 3-2. Philadelphia's Phillies rose out of the cellar by noosing out Brooklyn 7 to 6. Pittsburgh at Chicago was washed out.

Jimmy Fox drove out his 21st home run for Philadelphia as the Athletics, champions of the American league, downed the Washington Senators 10 to 7. The New York Yankees crushed the Boston Red Sox 12 to 1. Babe Ruth drove out his 16th homer. A 6-run rally in the eighth inning gave Detroit a 10 to 9 victory over Cleveland. St. Louis at Chicago was washed out.

WILLS DEFEATS MATHIEU TO WIN FRENCH TITLE

Auteuil, France, June 6 (UP)—Helen Wills Moody has completed the first lap of her tennis drive toward all three of the world's major women's singles championships. She won the French title in Roland Garros stadium yesterday, brushing aside Mme. Rene Mathieu of France, 7-5, 6-1, thus completing her brilliant march through Europe's best with the loss of a set.

Now Mrs. Moody will seek the British title at Wimbledon, starting June 20, and then will defend her American championship at Forest Hills later in the year. The California ace twice has succeeded in winning all three championships in the same year. She has won the American title seven times; and the French and British crowns four times each but only in 1928 and 1929 did she win all three in the same year.

There does not appear to be any feminine player capable of taking a set from her right now although expert opinion was that she did not play as well here this year as she did in 1930 when she made her last trip to Auteuil.
