

VEHICLE RULES AND BRIDGE AT COUNCIL MEET

Silverton—The whole vehicle ordinance and the new bridge over Silver creek on James street were the topics claiming most of the time of Silverton's city councilmen at the regular meeting held Monday night at the city hall with the mayor, recorder and all councilmen present excepting Reynolds, who was out of town.

At two special meetings intervening between the regular May session and the June meeting, the one on May 13 was for the adoption of the resolution naming the depot for city funds, numbered city ordinance 234, which carried. Several feet of fire hose was ordered purchased for use by the Silverton volunteer fire department. The special meeting on May 16 was for authorizing the payment for labor on the James avenue bridge.

Under report of special or regular committee, Councilman Conrad, head of the bridge committee, recommended the removal of the old pier that is left under the new bridge. Other members agreed that the old pier had a poor footing and a heavy current or drift might easily through the structure against the new pier and weaken the bridge. Discussion of the feasibility of digging out the small island that was forming some distance below the bridge and was fast becoming an obstacle likely to collect driftwood and refer the current of the creek to a permanent damage to property owners, was favorably discussed, and thought to be a reasonable source of material for consideration in supply labor to those who wish to work for woodwork script. Another island below the railroad bridge was talked of as needing to be removed. Mayor Eastman left these matters in the hands of the street committee for a definite report.

Under communications two letters from the League of Oregon Cities concerning legislative bills were considered. The Marion county health department reported through W. E. Blinnhorn, dairy and food inspector, that all Silverton dairies and those contributing to Silverton's milk supply were satisfactory. That one dairy reported the last inspection had made the minor improvements necessary for a qualification. Concerning the refund of license money for dances, the proceeds of which had been used for charitable purposes at the new hall of the St. Paul's Catholic parish was to be considered later when a report will be given.

A motion by Councilman Garver passed, authorizing the purchase of motor registration books which are used daily by the mayor, city police, and the state authorities to ascertain ownership of certain cars as to numbers. R. A. Pitney, constable, was specially mentioned and complimented for his fine spirit of cooperation with the city authorities in aiding the proper enforcement of law, and suggestion was made that he be given a key admitting him to the use of the private police phone, the same privilege as the state police have. Numerous cases of Pitney's help were cited and appreciation was expressed for his unselfish aid. Reports on the water commission and police car were accepted.

The library report showed books loaned out in May as 963, being short of the April loan of 1116. The librarian, Miss Lillie Madson, attributed this falling off of books loaned, to the changing seasons and to the closing of schools, bringing about final examinations. She also stated that during the first two days of June 182 more books were loaned than during the first two days of May. The report further gave for May, 14 new books added, and an equal number removed, with 12 new readers and one book donated by Mrs. Merlin Prather. Four books have been donated in June by Prof. Hal Campbell. Library rentals were listed at 54 cents, and rentals at \$6.29. Miss Madson requested the announcement that the library is especially low on books for very small children, and for all children up to the junior high school age, and that any donations of used or new books for children will be gratefully received.

The most satisfactory report of the evening's session was that concerning the cost of the new bridge to the citizens of Silverton, in labor and materials which totaled considerably less than \$2600. Brief reference was made to the establishing of the carts and cans for containers and removal of trash from the streets in a more satisfactory manner than is now in practice. Councilman Garver brought up the many times discussion of the wholesale vehicle ordinance. Time will come in July for another, and many times futile, attempt to collect justly from all wholesalers. The present method was openly talked of adversely, due largely to the unfairness of some paying the required fee and others avoiding it. Mayor Eastman placed the question of appealing the ordinance or retaining it as part of the law, in the hands of the judiciary committee, whose report

Silverton has been without a girl scout troop for a number of years.

The former troops were first organized in 1924 under the sponsorship of the Trinity church and the captaincy of Mrs. Alf O. Nelson, an experienced scout captain. 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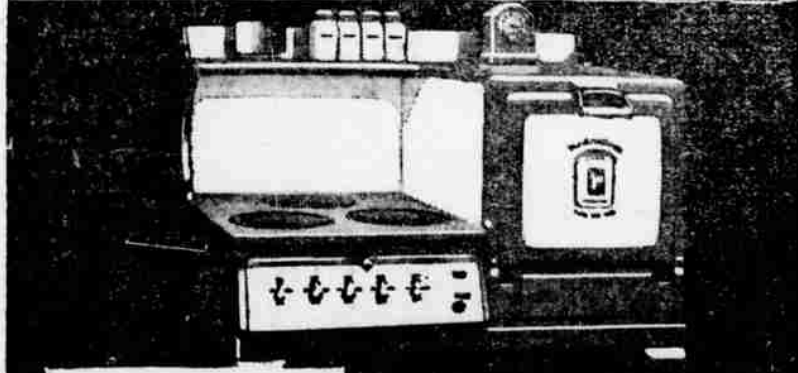


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
