

WEST SIDE CLUB OF PORTLAND TO PLAY SENATORS

The West Side club, one of Portland's two entries in the State baseball league, composed of a hustling bunch of youngsters who play heads up ball, will come here Sunday in an effort to keep the Salem Senators down in the cellar along with the Bend Elks. Displaying a powerful attack, the West Siders pounded two Bend pitchers last Sunday for 16 solid smacks, including three base hits by Koch and Eatch, third and first basemen respectively.

Against Bend the Portlanders started bunting tactics during the initial innings and when the Elks finally solved this form of attack the youngsters immediately began hitting the ball over their line of defense.

While the Senators infield looked

none too good against Eugene last Sunday, the slippery condition of the Lane county diamond made it difficult to field the ball. The Townies placed many of their hits well inside the base lines, making it difficult for the Senators to play the ball without falling down. The Senators on the other hand, hit harder, thus permitting the defense to play back on the grass.

Norval Libby, playing left field for the Townies, robbed the Senators of a couple of hits, once when he took Bashor's hard liner with one hand while traveling at top speed and again when he caught a high fly near the foul line while going full tilt.

An effort will be made to strengthen the pitching staff. Negotiations are under way to secure Art Gardner, the youngster who pitched for Gresham last year and played one game with the Senators. A chance to get John Beck was lost when it was found impossible to land a job for him here. It is understood he will continue to pitch for Woodburn although Albany is laying claim to him.

Wesley Ferrell Finally Squares Matters With A's, Bats In Winning Run

It took Wesley Ferrell the better part of two seasons to catch up with the Philadelphia Athletics, but Cleveland's ace could feel today that he had gone a long way toward squaring accounts with the Mack men.

They licked him five times last season and knocked him out of the box the first time they faced him in the current campaign. That might have convinced a pitcher less obstinate than Ferrell, but it only made him more determined to crack the A's, and he finally turned the trick yesterday.

Facing the Athletics in their first appearance in the west, he personally pitched and batted them into submission, 4 to 3. With the score tied in the seventh, he doubled and then scored the winning run on Port-

er's two-bagger off the screen. The victory moved the Indians into fourth place. It was Ferrell's tenth triumph of the year. But for Al Simmons, who belted two home runs, it would have been a breeze for the Indian right-hander.

The New York Yankees continued to bowl merrily along as they opened their western tour with a 9 to 2 decision over Detroit. The Tigers made six errors.

Washington scored four runs off Vic Frasier in the 11th frame to down the Chicago White Sox 8 to 5, and the St. Louis Browns gave the west an even break for the day by defeating the unfortunate Boston Red Sox 6 to 1. Homeruns by Goose Goslin and Irving Burns featured the Browns' easy victory behind Walter Steward.

The first day's inter-sectional warfare in the National league saw first place again change hands and further tightened up one of the hottest races the older circuit has experienced in years. Only seven and one-half games separated first and eighth place today, compared to the 22½ game disparity between New York and Boston in the American.

Boston, held idle by rain took over the top again when Chicago's youthful mound sensation, failed to go the full route for the first ten starts, when the Dodgers, aided by two errors, counted six runs in the seventh inning.

A brace of home runs by Mel Ott, one with a man on base, were all the Giants needed to nose out Cincinnati, 4 to 3.

Led by young Floyd Vaughan, who pounded a double and four singles in five trips, Pittsburgh opened its eastern trip with a 7 to 4 win over the Phillies. The victory put the pirates only three games out of second place.
