OPEN FIGHT TO REMOVE CURTIS AS TICKET TAIL

Illinois Delegation Seeks To Nominate Dawes For Vice President
Drys Begin Attack on Re-submission Plank in Platform

Chicago, June 13 (UP)—Administration forces mobilized at convention headquarters today to fight off raids on the White House program which is understood to call for renomination of Vice President Curtis and adoption of a re-submission plank.
One of the last of the cabinet strategists to arrive, Secretary of Agriculture Hyde, without attempting to speak for the administration declared it his own personal view that Curtis should be renominated.
"It is my own personal opinion," he said to the United Press, "that Vice President Curtis has been co-operative and helpful and is entitled to renomination."
This statement was echoed privately by half a dozen of the men most intimately associated with President Hoover.
It was expected to effect final collapse of the attempt to draft former Vice President Dawes, Secretary of War Hurley or another.

CHAPLIN BACK FROM ORIENT

Vancouver, B. C. June 13 (UP)—Charles Chaplin, comedian, returned today from Europe and the Orient today bringing with him economic theories which have nothing to do with the new silent picture he will produce.
The man whose acting in derby, cane and floppy shoes convulsed millions was considerably annoyed when he stepped from the steamer Hikawa Maru.
The Japanese vessel brought \$15,000,000 in gold from Japan. Charlie opposed the principle and the fact of that shipment.
"They say this money is brought to balance trade," he said.
"Well, those who insist on balancing trade should be prosecuted. What human beings endure patiently amazes me. There is a new world awakening in hand. People everywhere want more of the benefits and privileges of material plenty. "Financiers will have to take less profit."
"They call me a comedian. I've decided I'm as good an economist as financiers are comedians—if you know what I mean."
He said he had worked out in his own mind a new idea for a picture and would start production shortly.
"The picture will be silent, as far as I am concerned," said Chaplin.

Fleisher stood mute when arraigned before Recorder's Court Judge Edward J. Jeffries on a charge of killing three gangsters here last summer. June 22 was set as date for his examination.

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OREGON SEEKS A LIBERALIZED LIQUOR PLANK

State Delegation Appoints Stanley Myers On Committee
Derby Put on Permanent Organization — Plan Vote for Hoover

Chicago, Ill., June 13 (UP)—Oregon has added its efforts to the movement to write a liberalized liquor plank into the republican platform.
Stanley Myers, of Portland, today was appointed to the resolution and platform committee and Oregon's delegation of 13 voted to instruct him to use every effort in behalf of re-submission of the liquor question but against return of the open saloon. The vote was 9 to 2. Two delegates who voted no explained they did so because they do not favor modification.
By a vote of ten to two the delegation, which was pledged to Joseph I. France, of Maryland, agreed to support him only so long as he has any chance of nomination.
If before Oregon is called on the roll, it develops another candidate, the Oregonians reserved the right to vote any way they desire. This move met with vigorous protest from L. B. Sandblast, Oregon campaign manager for France, who declared the delegation was bound legally and morally to support Oregon preferential nominee.
Myers won the resolutions post by a vote of six to five over W. L.

RECORD BREAKING HEAT ON WANE

A record-breaking heat wave for early June seemed on the wane Monday, after heavy thunderstorms in the Cascade range Sunday night but cooled the air and relieved the humidity. At 12:45 o'clock Monday, 85 degrees were registered at the official government weather station at the airport, but the day was not so stifling as Sunday, when Salem sweltered under a maximum temperature of 93 with no breath of wind to make the heat more comfortable. Maximum temperature Saturday was 91, 93 on Friday and 89 on Thursday, the heat wave coming abruptly after a maximum temperature of 76 degrees on last Wednesday.
This June is proving the warmest in a number of years. In June, 1931, the temperature reached above 90 but once, and in 1930, the mercury likewise touched the 90 mark but once. During the month of June in both 1929 and 1928, the thermometer failed to register 90 degrees at all.

INDUSTRIES IN PRISON CLOSED

Joliet, Ill., June 13 (UP)—It's "bend to the left" and "bend to the right" and no more work in the factory for inmates of the Illinois state penitentiary from now on.
Warden Henry C. Hill has issued an order for immediate closing of all the prison shops, announcing lack of orders made their operation unprofitable. And daily calisthenics, he said, will take the place of work in the steel foundry and shoe, furniture and food factories for the convicts.

AUTO TAX DUE ON DATE OF DELIVERY

Washington, June 13 (UP)—The house ways and means committee today unanimously reported an amendment to the tax bill designed to prevent the loss of \$60,000,000 in automobile excise taxes levies in the new revenue bill.
The automobile taxes becomes effective June 21, but the committee was informed that many firms plan to evade the levy by contracting for automobile purchases now. The amendment would make the sales tax applicable as of date of delivery rather than contract date.
HOOPER SIGNS BILL
Washington, June 13 (UP)—President Hoover today signed an act authorizing Secretary Hurley to lend war department equipment to the American Legion for use at its 14th national convention next September at Portland, Oregon.

Rescue Bodies Of Lovers In Pele's Crater

Hilo, Hawaii, June 13 (UP)—Man descended into the fuming crater of Halemaumau—"house of everlasting fire"—and reclaimed from Pele, the fire goddess, the bodies of a despairing lover and the sweet-heart he slew before leaping into the volcano slapping her body.
A daring Japanese contractor, Rikan Kunishi, gambled with death yesterday as he was lowered into the fumes of Kilauea volcano, returning eight hours later with the bodies of Sylvester Nunes, 29, and Margaret Enos, 17.
The descent was made in a tiny cage suspended perilously from a cable stretched across the gaping pit into which Kunishi would have plunged to a boiling death in the

HAUSNER FOUND ADRIFT AT SEA

S. S. Circle Shell, June 13 (UP)—Stanislaus Felix Hausner, New Jersey movie operator whose attempt at a trans-Atlantic flight to his native Poland ended in the sea, was today exhausted to tell the story.
He was resting aboard this ship and under treatment, but promising to be completely restored to health before he arrives in New Orleans, which probably will be in two weeks.
It was decided last night to abandon Hausner's red monoplane, in which he drifted for a week after falling a few hundred miles short of the European coast.
The plane was left drifting in approximately 42.41.18 north latitude and 20.04 longitude west. Darkness which fell shortly after Hausner was rescued made it impossible to pick up the plane. At it faded from view it was drifting southward at a speed of about one knot an hour.
New Orleans, June 13 (UP)—Stanislaus P. Hausner, Polish flyer, rescued Saturday night in mid-ocean from the plane in which he attempted to span the Atlantic, was revealed today as a former brother of the Order of the Sacred Heart and a teacher in St. Aloysius college here.

COMMUNISTS TO SUCCEED DAVILA

Santiago, Chile, June 13 (UP)—Senator Manuel Hidalgo, communist leader whose policies are modeled on those of Soviet Russia, was considered a likely successor today to Carlos Davila, who resigned suddenly as the head of Chile's communist regime.
The upset in the new administration was forecast by reports that members of the Junta disagreed on important questions. Troops were confined to barracks, but the country was reported quiet.
Davila told the United Press his resignation was due to disagreement with one member of the Junta. It was understood there had been a demand for a military government, supported by a civil cabinet under Davila.
General Marmaduke Grove, called by many supporters the "soul of the revolution," issued a communique as minister of defense denying the military had sought increased powers in the regime.

FRANCE IN FAVOR OF VOLSTEAD REPEAL

Chicago, June 13 (UP)—Joseph I. France, of Maryland, President Hoover's only opponent for the republican presidential nomination, said today he favored not only the repeal of the 18th amendment, but also the "earliest possible repeal of the Volstead act."
"No other congressional legislation should be submitted," he said, "except a provision for taxation of the sale of beer and wines to provide \$500,000,000 for public revenue."

Yeggmen Take \$400 From Safe At Club

Portland, June 13 (UP)—Approximately \$400 was obtained last night by yeggmen who punched the safe in the office of the Rose City Golf course clubhouse. They apparently gained entrance through an unlocked side door. Police found no fingerprints and said the burglars left no tools.
M. R. Hausmann, superintendent, said the contents of the safe were insured.

Mexico City, June 13 (UP)—Earthquake shocks continued today in the state of Colima, the newspaper Universal reported.

GIRL'S SUICIDE BLAMED UPON JERSEY POLICE

British Parliament Asked To Protest Treatment Of Violet Sharpe
Police Deny Charges — Legislature To Probe Handling of Case

Alpine, N. J., June 13 (UP)—The case of Violet Sharpe, English domestic waitress, was an international aspect today as police denied accusations that they hurried her to death.
The charge, voiced indignantly in the English press, was followed by news that labor members of parliament were expected to ask the British government today to make representations to the United States about the case. She took poison in the home of Mrs. Dwight W. Morrow last Friday as police arrived to question her anew about her movements the night Charles A. Lindbergh, Jr., was kidnapped.
After watching the theory they built up against Miss Sharpe and Ernest Brinkner, cab driver from White Plains, N. Y., go to pieces, police bustled themselves with final checkups.
"There was never undue pressure brought to bear during her questioning by the police," Col. Norman Bee, said. "On each of the four occasions members of the Morrow or Lindbergh households were present."
"In view of Ernest Miller's statement and Brinkner's alibi, do you still believe Violet Sharpe had guilty knowledge of the crime? Will you publicly exonerate her?"

MOTHER OF IRISH PRESIDENT DIES

Rochester, N. Y., June 13 (UP)—In the modest home where she had lived quietly for the past 37 years, Mrs. Eamon De Valera, mother of Eamon De Valera, president of the Irish Free State, died yesterday.
De Valera was her only son by her marriage to Vivian De Valera, a Spanish sculptor and musician whom she met in New York shortly after her immigration from county Limerick, Ireland. After his death and her subsequent marriage in 1887 to Charles H. Wheelwright, Mrs. Wheelwright sent Eamon to relatives in Ireland. He last visited his mother in December.
Mrs. Wheelwright, who was 74, came to this country in 1876 and trained as a nurse in a New York City hospital.
Besides the Irish political leader, she leaves a son by her second marriage, the Rev. Thomas J. Wheelwright, C. S. R., of West End, N. J.

REDFIELD DIES DURING SLUMBER

New York, June 13 (UP)—William C. Redfield, 73, secretary of commerce during the Wilson administration, died at his Brooklyn home today.
Mrs. Elsie Redfield, whom the former secretary married in 1885, found her husband dead when she went to his room to awaken him this morning. The Redfields had two children, Humphrey Redfield and Mrs. Charles Drury.

Mining Operations On Little North Fork Given Official Start Sunday

Marion county mining operations definitely got under way Sunday with the first grinding of ore at the Amalgamated mines and concentrating mills in the Santiam national forest 55 miles from Salem on the upper Little North Fork of the Santiam river. The formal grand opening of the mine was attended by more than 200 persons, most of them stockholders from Portland. Joe Hewitt was the official host for the day.
The mining operations are the culmination of three years' consistent work upon the part of those in charge and the first substantial showing of development of the mining property on a large scale since its discovery nearly 40 years ago. The mill has a present capacity of 200 tons of ore a day and this can

Willamette Grads Hear Coleman On Larger Patriotism

The senior class of Willamette university was graduated Monday forenoon when diplomas were awarded to 82 students in bachelor of arts, 10 in bachelor of law, one in master of arts and two in music, during the 88th annual commencement exercises held in the First Methodist Episcopal church.
Honors and prizes awarded for class work and accomplishments of students were announced following the presentation of diplomas.
President Norman Coleman of Reed college delivered the address, taking as his subject "The Larger Patriotism." He pointed out that while patriotism is a sacred thing, and necessary in national welfare, yet it can become a positive menace to the peace of the world.
Since the war, the speaker said, some citizens have used patriotism as the means of limiting the liberties of others who do not happen to believe as they do while others professing 100 per cent patriotism would deny others the right to do their own thinking.
He said that America has spent more money than any other nation of the world since the war in Europe, not because this country is in

FARM RELIEF PLANK SOUGHT

Chicago, June 13 (UP)—Leaders of the three largest groups of organized farmers today sought a few minutes from James R. Garfield, chairman of the resolutions committee, in which to urge a farm relief plank for adoption by the republican national convention.
The American farm bureau federation, the national range and the farmers' union were in virtual agreement upon the four points of a resolution to be presented by a joint representative.
An amendment to the federal marketing act to take care of surplus crops through the tariff, bettering rural credit, economy in government and stabilization of the farm dollars were the thoughts decided upon for incorporation in the organized farmers' plan.
While the principal tenets of the three groups remained far apart, that difficulty was surmounted by an agreement to urge that the federal farm board be authorized to adopt the method of its choice or a consolidation of the best points of the three plans sponsored by the farm groups.
There remained recollections of the demonstration before the resolutions committee at Kansas City four years ago when farmers stormed the committee hearing, and there was a determination of the leaders not to repeat that gesture.

BRITAIN TO DEMAND PAYMENT BY CHILE

London, June 13 (UP)—Britain will demand full compensation if British property is confiscated by the new socialist regime in Chile, the house of commons was told today.
Captain Anthony Eden, foreign undersecretary, was cheered when in reply to a question by Sir Arthur Samuel, he announced Britain had not entered into official relations with the new Chilean government.
"His Majesty's charge d'affaires," Eden said, "has been instructed to inform them that his Majesty's government takes the most serious view of their confiscatory measures, and that if they are carried through, will strongly support a demand for full compensation to British interests affected."

ORPHEUM THEATER RAIDED BY ROBBERS

San Francisco, June 13 (UP)—Three bandits were being sought today after paying their way into the Orpheum theater here last night, binding and gagging the manager and his assistant, and escaping with \$1,917.50, week-end receipts of the house.
An audience of several thousand persons watched the show, not knowing the holdup was taking place.
The three bandits looted the safe in the main floor office and held Manager George Bole and his assistant, Robert G. Haines, prisoners until the show ended. Then warning the captives to make no outcry, the trio mingled with the outgoing crowd and escaped.
Bole said he believed the robbers were the same trio that held up the Orpheum theater in Los Angeles two weeks ago, escaping with nearly \$3000. The same tactics were used in both cases, he declared.

Postoffice Vault Looted At Hillsboro

Hillsboro, Ore., June 13 (UP)—Burglars broke into the Hillsboro postoffice last night, broke open the safe and stole a quantity of registered mail and money order blanks. Entrance was gained through a side window.
The robbery was discovered about 6:30 o'clock this morning by Carl Christensen, a sub-clerk, whom he came to work. Federal postoffice inspectors were called from Portland.
Local police said they believed the job was done by professionals. There were few marks on the outer door of the safe and apparently no finger prints.

VETERANS WIN SHOWDOWN BY VOTE 226-117

House To Debate and Ballot on \$2,400,000 Bonus Bill Tomorrow
Butler Votes For and Hawley Votes Against Consideration

Washington, June 13 (UP)—The house today voted to call up the \$2,400,000 cash bonus payment legislation for formal consideration. This action represented a step toward victory for the 20,000 war veterans in Washington to demand immediate payment of the bonus certificates.
While the vote was being taken, and long before, the house galleries were packed with former service men. Outside long lines of veterans stood.
If the house approves the bonus payment on the final vote, the legislation still must run the gauntlet of the senate and the White House. What action the senate will take is problematical. But President Hoover has promised to veto.
Action today came on a motion to bring the resolution by Representative Patman (D., Texas) up for consideration. The vote was 226-117.

BINGHAM LEADS REPEAL FIGHT

Chicago, June 13 (UP)—The fight for outright repeal of the prohibition amendment will be led on the floor of the republican national convention by Senator Hiram Bingham of Connecticut.
It became necessary for Bingham to make the fight instead of Dr. Nicholas Murray Butler of New York, the other leader of the extreme anti-prohibition wing of the party, because the latter will not be a member of the resolutions committee. Under the conventions rules he is prevented from making a minority report.
Bingham was Connecticut's member of the resolutions committee. New York's member will be Secretary Ogden L. Mills, who while he agrees with Butler on the prohibition issue does not feel in a position to take a leading role in the struggle because of his administration position.

SPEAKER GARNER REMAINS IN BED

Washington, June 13 (UP)—Speaker Garner was reported improved today although his physician ordered that he stay in bed.
The Texan's office was notified that his temperature was about normal but that Dr. George Calver, house physician, fearing a possible setback from bronchitis, thought the speaker should not plan to return to work until after the middle of the week.
Representative Rainey of Illinois, house democratic leader and speaker in Garner's absence, said he had talked with the speaker who "seemed to be feeling a lot better."
