

BUREAU MAKES ESTIMATES ON OREGON CROPS

A 62 per cent cherry crop; 40 per cent dried plum crop and 60 per cent green plum crop; a 77 per cent apple crop and 87 per cent raspberry production, are estimates just released by the Federal crop reporting bureau at Portland in a bulletin on Oregon fruits. Pear production in the state is placed at 2,988,000 bushels as compared to 1,955,000 last year and a five year average of 1,865,000 bushels.

Commenting more particularly on the various crops the bulletin says: The cherry crop prospects are extremely variable, but the June first condition is slightly higher than in either of the past two years, due to some extent to very favorable outlook in Wasco County, one of the most important commercial districts. Present condition is estimated at 62 per cent.

Dried plums are a complete failure in many orchards and prospects generally are poor. The June first condition of only 40 per cent is ten per cent lower than last year. Poor prospects are mostly attributed to cold rainy weather during blossoming and pollenization and to some frost damage.

Fresh plums on the other hand show up very good and are much better than a year ago. It is a little early in the case of all plums for a very definite idea on what the final harvest will be.

Oregon apricots promise a very good crop. Prospects for all berry crops in the state are good to very good, but warmer weather is needed. The season is considerably behind. Strawberry harvest is on at the present time with a normal crop generally and the most unfavorable market condition in years and growers are very discouraged. Raspberry condition of 87 per cent compares with 82 a year ago. Blackcaps, however, are below last year.

The June first report of the Division of Crop and Livestock Estimates indicates a pear crop of 2,988,000 bushels in Oregon. The June first condition of pears is almost average. Weather conditions during May were mostly cool but there was a very small amount of frost damage. It had become apparent on June first that the effects of the severe drought of last season will be felt to some extent in production in Jackson County. However, it will be difficult to determine just how much loss will be occasioned from this cause until after the June drop. On June first prospects were fair to good in this section for most varieties with the Bose variety showing up the poorest. There is a plentiful moisture supply generally. Elsewhere in the state pear prospects are rather spotted and uneven. The Jackson County commercial crop may run around 3,500 cars.

The pear crop for the entire country is estimated at 21,487,000 bushels, almost exactly the same as the 5-year average. The peach crop is much below average and not much more than one half the estimated total of last year, which included considerable which were not harvested because of unfavorable market conditions. The chief reason for present poor peach prospects is the severe cold experienced earlier in the Southern peach producing area.

Oregon peaches show up with fair to good prospects, generally, but very spotted and uneven. This is true of both early and late varieties. Some leaf curl and blight is reported from several sections. The cold weather has been unfavorable to the crop but the June first estimated production of 316,000 bushels is considerable more than has been harvested any season since 1928.

The Oregon apple crop shows up very promising at this early date. Cold rainy weather has not been harmful from present indications. The unprecedented worm damage of last season has stimulated careful attention to current spray programs. Moisture supply is plentiful and June first condition is reported at 77 per cent compared with 66 per cent a year ago and a 10-year average of 81.

TEXAS HUB FOR TRAVEL BY AIR

Port Worth, Texas (UP)—The Southwest is destined to become one of the most fertile fields of aviation in the United States, officials of air-travel companies predict, with Texas to become the hub of the travel-wheel.

Parts of the enthusiasm aroused in aviation experts was due to the selection of Port Worth as Southern headquarters for American Airways and the contracted construction of a \$150,000 plant to house shops and personnel.

American Airways will concentrate its shops and most of its personnel from other points along the route from Los Angeles to Atlanta, at Port Worth. More than 400 employees, with an annual payroll of half a million dollars, will be stationed here.

In 1927 the first air mail landed in Texas. A year later the first passenger route was established, locally owned and operated in the Southwest. Five years later at least four major trunk lines have cut across the region and dozens of local companies operate shorter lines.

SOVIET VESSEL VIOLATES RULE OF SAILORMEN

London (UP)—Salty old British seadogs, descended from many generations of adventurous mariners and with sea water, rather than blood, in their veins are disgusted.

The object of their loathing is the Soviet ship Neva, which arrived here recently with a consignment of Black Sea butter. It is not because the Neva is a foreign ship, nor that she brought foreign produce in spite of the "Buy British" campaign. But the Russian builders of this new vessel have dared to violate all the noble traditions of the sea by designing a ship without the beloved steering wheel.

The forefathers of these old salts fought hard to retail sails, ropes, rigging and wooden hulls, but gradually resigned themselves to steam clear superstructure and steel. Many of the present generation have even been converted from steam to motor power, but a ship without a steering wheel is regarded by most British seamen as the very last straw.

If this Russian innovation is universally accepted, the traditional warning, "Don't talk to the man at the wheel," will have to be changed to "Don't interfere with the him-man's buttons," for steering on the Neva is done by a series of electric buttons. It is almost impossible to imagine a picture of the typical regged seaman, grim and determined rain and sea water pouring from

his oilskin coat and sou'-wester, battling against the gale by tapping his fingers on little buttons set on the top of what looks like a steam radiator.

In order to port the helm, the helmsman merely presses the appropriate button and an indicator needle tells him if he has sufficient swing on the vessel. Should a sharper turn be necessary, other buttons may be pressed.
