

OREGON STATE GRANGE CONVENTION UNDER WAY

CHANGES MADE FOR PROGRAMS BY COMMITTEE

Silverton—Two lengthy sessions were held by the executive committee Monday to clear the decks for the official opening of the 59th annual session of the Oregon state grange Tuesday morning with more than 300 credited delegates expected. Program changes for the week and discussion of numerous questions not ready for public consideration occupied the committee. Speakers for the Wednesday evening program decided upon were Arthur W. Lawrence and W. J. Hindley, the suggestion being made that the latter talk upon the chain store problem.

Welcome to Silverton was given the grangers Tuesday morning by Earl Adams of the chamber of commerce, with State Master Glover giving his annual address. Through arrangements completed by Mrs. Marie Flint McCall, state lecturer, J. J. Handsaker, Portland, associate secretary of the national council for prevention of war, spoke at the lecturer's hour at 8 o'clock. The evening program will begin at 8 o'clock and will be open to the public, with the main speaker Dr. W. H. Roberts, of the Hinson Memorial Baptist church in Portland. Musical numbers will be given by the Silverton orchestra, directed by Fred Baker. Kitchen Klansmen band of the Chehalis Central grange; vocal trio, Madge Gill, Bertha Roy and Marjorie Webber with Mrs. Paw Accompanist; vocal solo by Mrs. P. G. Roubal, accompanied by Mrs. Edson Comstock and selections by Benton's old-time orchestra. A spelling contest will be a feature.

Prominent among the visitors is Walter M. Pierce, former governor of Oregon, whose booming voice resounds through the halls and who is kept busy greeting old friends and meeting new ones.
