

EDUCATIONAL SUBJECTS DISCUSSED BY GRANGERS

'DIRT FARMERS' ARE WANTED AS BOARD MEMBERS

Silverton—Much discussion characterized the morning business session of the Oregon state grange held Thursday in the Eugene Field auditorium, concerning the report of the standing committee on education. The demands, or suggestions, that certain policies be determined by the people through legislation rather than by faculties of schools or boards of education, met popular recommendations from the grangers. These included such questions as student fees, professional school needs of being self-supporting, beyond undergraduate work; instructors taking leave of absence on full or part pay, and the question of pensions. One recommendation of the committee on the repeal of the millage tax at this time was adopted. Further recommendations were made that the expenditure for higher education be kept within the limits of the millage tax for the present and all continuing appropriations to the amount of \$154,970 be abolished. The previous question as amended was adopted. Further, their interest in things educational, the grangers recommended that a demand be determined to bring the normal schools up to a standardization comparable with other normals of other states. At least standardize one of the state normals. This carried unanimously. The grange went on record as insuring the legislative committee to draw a bill creating a smaller board of education, consisting of two from each congressional district with the positive requirement that two of the members be "dirt farmers." The motion was carried and the recommendation of the educational committee adopted.

The Thursday afternoon business program was a continuation of resolutions adopted, considered, or laid on the table. The session was held in the Eugene Field auditorium. The first resolution passed after the early afternoon program of drill contents held at the armory was one from the McMinnville grange recommending that the grangers who are borrowers of the Spokane Federal Reserve Land bank, do their utmost to bring about the election of a director who is a farmer and a borrower of the bank. This is a farm owned bank but managed exclusively by bankers, real estate dealers and other business men causing the farmer owner to be left out of his own property. After a lengthy discussion the resolution was approved and adopted.

A resolution was introduced from the Umatilla county Pomona grange going on record favoring national non-contributory plan of old age pensions with the revenue to be derived from the federal treasury. At first it was moved to lay it on the table and was lost. After more than a half hour's discussion, a motion to postpone definite action on this bill was passed. Corridor discussions seemed to favor the idea that the grange group didn't want to confuse the action with this bill which is to be presented at the state legislature.

A resolution from the Pine Forest grange recommending that the constitution of the United States be amended so as to abolish the electoral college and to provide a system whereby the president and vice president of the United States be elected by direct popular vote, was reported favorably and a motion to postpone was lost, but the resolution was eventually adopted. A resolution from the Mosier grange to request the state grange legislative committee to formulate an endeavor to have the Oregon laws amended so as to provide reimbursement for losses caused by dogs destroying poultry and other livestock was favorably discussed and passed. The reason for this desire was because a number of poultry men had lost valuable chickens by prowling dogs in the last year and although a \$2 tax must be paid on all dogs the Oregon law as it now stands seems to cover only the loss of sheep. The fifth and sixth degree team work featured Thursday night's special program. This was held at the armory.

OFFICIAL VOTE OF GRANGE HAS LITTLE CHANGE

Silverton—The official voting for the officers resulted in the positive election as had been previously determined by popular vote, of Ray W. Gill of Portland as State Master; M. C. Glover, State Overseer; Mrs. Marie Flint, McCall, State Lecturer; J. D. Chittwood, State Chaplain; Bertha Beck, State Secretary; L. F. Bailey, State Gatekeeper; R. M. Nedrow, State Treasurer; and three members of the executive committee, Walter M. Pierce, Dr. A. Slaughter, and George A. Palmer. The voting took place from 7:30 to 8:30, Wednesday and demanded a second ballot which was voted Thursday noon to consider the two highest candidates for various offices as none had received a majority.

The results of the second ballot were: Steward, S. J. Howard 156, J. A. Nice 81; assistant steward, Henry Gustafson 146, Theodore Ray 90; Ceres, Cora Hansen 191, Alice Hamilton 139; Pomona, Dorothea Mack 135, Frances Wilson 99; Flora, Mildred Crow 139, Ada Kelley 97; lady assistant steward, Alice Goff 139, Eleanor McCully 109.

Under direction of Mrs. E. A. Blake, Juvenile Grange Matron, members of three juvenile granges, Fairmont, Russellville and Williamette, put on a most attractive program at the armory Thursday afternoon. Gene Ackley of the Eastern Star Juveniles of Deschutes county, gave a recitation, and Albert Saxton of the Willamette juveniles acted as pianist for the marchers. The matron, Mrs. Blake, then gave her annual report which showed splendid progress in the year's juvenile work.

Mrs. Lydia M. Carter, of Oregonia, who is more than 90 years old, was accorded special honor as being the first woman Master of a grange in the United States. She served in this capacity in 1878 in the Tualitan Grange. Mrs. Carter is the oldest granger present at the convention. The youngest Master of a grange in Oregon was finally decided to be Claire Sutton, aged 17, of Linnaw grange, after the honor had been accorded to Kenneth Palmer, Garfield Grange who is also 17 years old and only two months older than Sutton.

The exact number of Grangers attending the early morning trip to the state park to see the wonders of the Silver Creek falls and stopping on the return home at the Silverton Hills community club hall for breakfast, has been estimated at 842. Others say the number was more than a thousand and yet some claim 875. At any rate, the group was exceptionally large and considering the late hours necessary in attending the reasons of the convention, and five o'clock start, the crowd was in splendid spirits. They returned to Silverton in time for the 8:30 o'clock session.
