

STATE BANK PLAN APPROVED BY OREGON GRANGE

COMMERCE FLOW WOULD BE AIDED THRU CONGRESS

Silverton—Without doubt, the biggest thing of the convention of the Oregon State Grange in session at Silverton, was the report of the Interim-Banking Commission appointed by the executive committee on the order of the last year's state session and composed of Peter Zimmerman, Martin Tompkins and W. E. Burke, all of Yamhill county. They made two recommendations.

First, "we recommend that this right—to coin money—be reassumed by Congress of the United States, and further recommend that Congress issue necessary currency to transact the business of our nation, so that commerce may flow free and unobstructed between producer and consumer at all times."

"We firmly believe that it is the duty of Congress to write across the face of all currency the following words: 'Good in payment of all debt, both public and private.' Any person discounting or attempting to discount, such currency emblematic of the sovereign power of our nation shall be guilty of a crime, and shall be punished to the full extent of the law." This was adopted, as was the following:

"We recommend that the State Grange direct and empower the executive committee to draft a suitable banking act. The act declaring the purpose of the state of Oregon to engage in the Banking business and to establish a system of Banking under the name of the Bank of Oregon, operated by state and doing a general business. Said bank to be a depository for all state and county, and municipal funds. Said banking act provide for the necessary constitutional amendments of the state. The executive committee shall be empowered to make necessary arrangements and proceed in initiating the same."

Beginning late in the afternoon in an attempt to close the business of the convention without holding sessions over into Saturday, the meeting was opened with Mabel Horton conducting Mrs. Elsie McGall to the altar and in behalf of the Brush College grange of which she is a member, presented her with a potted plant, a calendar. A rising vote of thanks was tendered George Schmeier, Master of the California state grange, for his initiatory work in the installation ceremonies of the newly elected officers.

The Home Economics committee of the Silverton Hills Grange sent a note of thanks for the patronage of the state grange convention visitors for their patronage at the Thursday morning breakfast. They reported a clearing of more than \$130 on the breakfast. They reported, further, that they used three cases of eggs, 18 pounds of coffee and 15,000 strawberries, averaging three inches in circumference.

Mrs. George Schmeier, wife of the state master of the California grange, who is here with her husband, gave a heartily recalled reading.

Mrs. Mary S. Howard moved that the convention send Florence A. Dickinson, of Oswego, chairman of the first Home Economics committee of Oregon State Grange, flowers and greetings.

The By-Laws committee ratified the proposed By-Laws of the National Grange which will permit subordinate granges to elect officers in November and install them in December, desiring the change to give them more time to get established in the work for the year, and on account of the heavy snows of the later months hindering the attendance in certain parts of Oregon.

A resolution from the Cherry Park Grange of Wasco county, related to the informal organization of the grange councils which are composed of two representatives from each grange in the county to meet monthly.

Reports of the special committee appointed by the executive committee, composed of Miss Bertha J. Beck, Charles Wickhamer, and Arthur Brown, to make the Smith-Hughes act study, reported and curtailment of the vocational agricultural work, would be a step backward. The report of the sub-committee was adopted.

A resolution of the Applegate Grange in Jackson county, which would authorize each county deputy to question representing the state as to his political platform if elected, received unfavorable report, and laid it on the table.

INDIAN PLANS TOLD GRANGERS AT SILVERTON

Silverton—There have been many resolutions introduced during the state grange convention but without question the most important and far reaching in influence is the one submitted in support of the resolution passed by the Willamette River grange asking the state grange to endorse the principle involved in section 3588 which is to allow the Klamath Indians to incorporate for the purpose of timber farming.

The bill was introduced by Wade Crawford, Klamath Indian, who organized the Willamette River grange No. 715 near Klamath Falls four years ago with the assistance of H. E. Keeney. Mr. and Mrs. Crawford are attending the convention here. With them is Edward Cookman, master of the Willamette River grange and a full-blooded Klamath Indian. He is the only full-blooded Indian delegate at the convention. Other Klamath Indians attending are Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Long and Mr. and Mrs. P. J. Long, all of the Willamette River district.

Crawford returned June 6 from Washington, D. C., where, as the originator of S. 3588, he introduced this measure before the appropriation committees of congress on the interior bill and showed them where they could make a saving by reduction of the appropriation of \$225,000 to \$112,000 by reducing the personnel of those assisting the unimproved, practically all of which are of large eastern capitalistic firms, which are carrying out the 19 contracts now in effect in the extensive timber holdings on the reservation of the Klamath Indians.

The Willamette river grange has 37 members, of which over two-thirds are Indians. These Indians are highly educated and are occupied in cattle raising and timber projects. Crawford and Cookman are graduates of federal Indian school, Cookman attending an Indian school in Arizona and Crawford a graduate of Chemawa and formerly a student of Willamette university. Both men and Mrs. Crawford, who understands as well as the Indians and other Indians of the Klamath tribe the need embodied in S. 3588, appeared before the grange session Friday morning and presented arguments explaining the mission on the senate bill.

The bureau at Washington, D. C. has apparently cooperated with the Klamath Indians in allowing them to form a business committee composed of eight members, of which woman, Mrs. Crawford, is secretary and Wade Crawford chairman.

Silverton—Under the direction and training of Mr. and Mrs. W. R. Dallas of the Red Hills grange of Marion county, the team which was a picked group from the Marion county granges, put on the most spectacular fifth degree work ever staged in the state grange of Oregon at the armory Thursday night.

In regard to taxes, amend section 2, article 2 of the constitution of Oregon which limits the right to vote on question to levy tax or issuing bonds, real or personal property, situated in tax levying or bond issuing district and taxed therefore. Disapproval of the criminal syndicalism law of Oregon as an abridgement of the provision of the constitution of the United States for the freedom of the press, speech and of assembly. Recommend the enactment of legislation providing for the complete liquidation of any mortgage through foreclosure.

Request the 1932 Oregon state grange legislature pass a statute requiring that the Salmon river super-road district be dissolved and further requiring the state of Oregon through the state highway commission to assume the balance remaining unpaid for on said super road, to-wit, approximately \$100,000. This was submitted by the legislative committee and adopted.

DELAYED TOPICS ARE ACTED UPON AS RESOLUTIONS

Silverton—Among the actions of the delegates of the state grange convention during the last session Friday night, they went on record as opposed to any kind of monopoly including chain stores. A substitute for resolution No. 6, was opposition to the county unit system. Asking the legislature not to endorse action taken by the Oregon state assessor's association. Substitute for No. 67 in which the educational committee reported favorably on the substitute that if chancellors were chosen, he be a man of proven capabilities in educational fields and in sympathy with students. Substitute No. 11 concerning the North Carolina educational control was left for special committee.

The grange favored change in auto license to \$5 and charge a property tax at time license is issued. Favor retirement of state bonds. They also favor a possibility of recalling school boards. Opposed to present system of bus transportation act, allowing people the right to vote on it locally. Study of Kellogg pact required as regular course. Urge liberal interpretation of rule permitting exemptions to military training. Adopted a resolution favoring reorganization of silver. Also adopted resolution grange to take steps starting a movement to compel banks to insure deposits.

The grange adopted the report of the committee on agriculture in regard to functioning of federal land banks. They condemn the excessive rate of interest and demand that federal land banks adopt an interest rate not to exceed five percent.

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The last long hours of the 58th annual convention extended until 2 o'clock Saturday morning. In continued round of discussions, disapproval, and adoption of various resolutions from 7 o'clock Friday evening. They acted upon more than 30 delayed topics, mostly in the form of resolutions submitted, but not one was shelved for lack of time.

The last word of the convention was a number of resolutions passed as one, in which the grangers expressed appreciation of the efforts of Earl J. Adams as head of the Silverton chamber of commerce, Superintendent Goetz of the Silverton schools who was present at all hours tending the hospitality of the school buildings to the visitors, and three pages of resolutions mentioning every person and organization in appreciation of which the grangers expressed a grateful pleasure during their stay here.
