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CHURCH READY TO CELEBRATE 40TH BIRTHDAY

Silverton—Festivities for the commemorating of the 40th anniversary of the Trinity Lutheran church will begin, according to Rev. Carl Foss, pastor, on Friday of this week with a Bible conference scheduled for 10 o'clock which will continue through Friday and Saturday.

Sunday night at 8 o'clock, a lecture entitled "Oberammergau, as Seen by an American," will be given by Rev. M. A. Christensen of Astoria. He will describe the famous passion play as given by the peasants of the village in Bavaria. The play is given every ten years and 642 actors take part. The time represents Christ's last week on earth from Palm Sunday to Easter morning. Appropriate music will be given at each service.
