PIONEER CLAN REUNION HELD FOR LEMMENS

Hopmore—The Pioneer Lemmen clan, who were early settlers in the present Hopmore neighborhood held a family reunion at Champoog with 60 descendants and relatives of Lemuel Lemmen and Mary J. Lemmen attending.

The clan organization was planned a year ago, when they met for the first time at the home in Polk county, where they moved from here 50 years ago. Lemuel Lemmen crossed the plains with his father in 1845 and Mary J. Lemmen crossed the plains with her father Sampson Jones, with an ox team in 1861, when she was 19 years old.

They settled on Mission Bottom, and were drowned out by the flood of 1861-62. Sampson Jones took his family to the mines in Bannock, Idaho. He made money, and returned to Oregon, and bought the farm now owned by Ella Finney. Grandfather Lemmen had taken up the donation land claim, just south, now owned by Egan Brothers and in the spring of 1867, Lemuel Lemmen married Mary Jones. Grandfather Lemmen had crossed the plains with an ox team in 1845. At his death the place was divided and Lemuel Lemmen became the owner of the part later sold to Krebs brothers.
