

JUSTICE COURT HAS BUSY TIME VARIED ACTIONS

Woodburn—Cases which came up in Judge Overton's court Friday were E. C. Mercer for operating a motor truck for transportation of commerce without a chauffeur's license; Jack Woods, Lyle Johnson and John Doe for possession of intoxicating liquor; B. E.
