

OLD OFFICERS OF CONVENTION ARE REELECTED

Auburn—The annual pioneer convention of the Haystack S. S. district which met at the historic Haystack Baptist church Sunday filled the church to overflowing.

The junior department, in charge of H. F. Shanks and Mrs. Charles W. Cady, which held an all-day session in the annex, had an attendance of 63 in the forenoon and 45 in the afternoon. In the business session the entire corps of officers were re-elected. They are: Miss Gladys Brown of Eldridge, district president; W. A. Starker of Brooks, vice-president; Miss Alice Massey of Clear Lake, secretary; Charles W. Cady of Auburn, publicity and display secretary. The September convention will be held at Labish Center.

In addition to the program as published, the western representatives of the Piney Woods country life school for negro children, who have been touring the west were in attendance at the convention and favored with several selections of vocal and instrumental music by Miss Ruth Bonham, Miss Gertrude Harrington and Miss Franta Baker, and Dr. Leroy J. Mitchell gave a talk, explaining the organization of the school. He said it was organized in 1907 by Lawrence C. Jones with one student on a long bench and that it has grown to a student body of 400, held in a brick structure, the brick and building made by the students.

Rev. H. C. Slover of Salem, who gave the afternoon address, said in part: "The Gospel and Jesus are adequate for this day in which we live." "We are still living by the rule of gold and not by the golden rule—Hence on depression." He also said "the wise missionary will leave his church at home and preach the gospel, for it is the gospel of Jesus Christ which saves souls."

In the junior department Genevieve Chastain gave orally the entire 53rd chapter of Isaiah, and Haystack, Keiser, Pratum M. E. Brooks, Eldridge, and Salem Japanese delegates answered to roll call with memory Bible texts. Eldridge Sunday school, the junior convention, attendance banner, Clear Lake, carried home the senior convention attendance banner; Labish Sunday school won the banner for the best average attendance. Brooks won second for junior convention attendance.

Among pioneers who were present at the organization of the district in June, 1893, were Mrs. Guy Looney, who later was one of the early district secretaries for the convention, Mrs. M. M. Halbert and Robert Loeb. To Tam Walker, also a pioneer, and who is confined to his bed, word of greeting and sympathy was sent from the convention to be carried personally by Rev. H. R. Scheureman.

SILVER TEA HELD

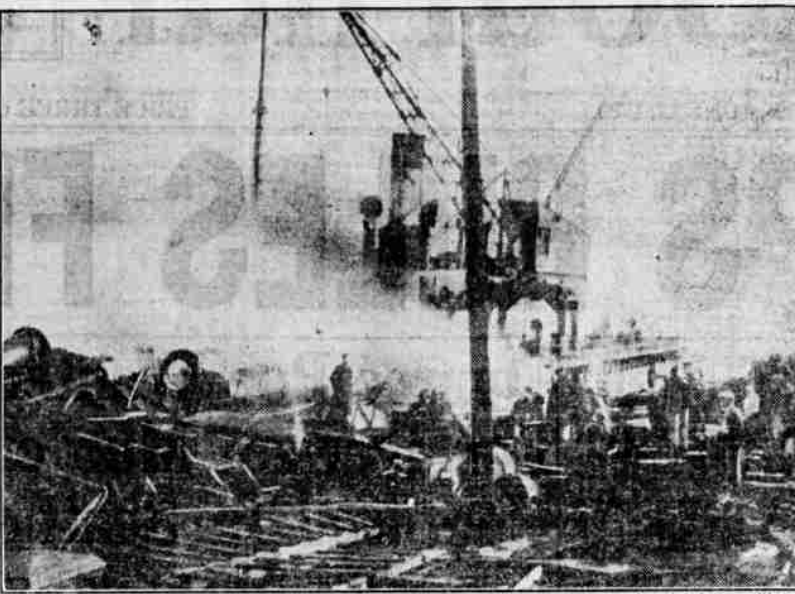

25 BELIEVED DEAD IN MONTREAL SHIP EXPLOSION



Eleven men were killed and 14 others were believed killed in Montreal, Canada, by a series of explosions and raging fire that wrecked the great Vickers drydock and the interior of the oil-tanker Cymbeline on which a hundred men were working. Among the varieties of lilies that were in full bloom and attracted attention were the Regal, Shasta, Lily of Nile, Pardinum, Cor, Santiam, Turk's Cap, Ear Drop, Peruvian, Humboldt Magnificum. A summer chrysanthemum in full bloom was a special object of beauty as were the tall stalks of the pink spirea and the cup and saucer Canterbury bells of various shades.
