

POLICE SEEK SWINDLE PAIR OF SILVERTON

Portland—Details of a clever swindle scheme that cost Ray Barkhurst of the Sediment Cap company, 168 Thompson street, \$2000 and resulted in warrants being issued for the arrest of Mr. and Mrs. J. McCallister of Silverton, Ore., were revealed in a report Monday by Tom Swanner, police detective. The allegations are these: McCallister, employed as a washing machine salesman at Silverton, was arrested after shortages in company funds were discovered, tried in court and acquitted of charges against him. In turn, he brought suit against his company for malicious prosecution and won a judgment of \$1200.

McCallister later came here and told Barkhurst he had filed another suit against the washing machine company seeking judgment for \$50,000, alleging the company had attempted to extort money from his sister—the money he was suspected of having taken. No such suit was ever filed, according to the account, but it was a good story and Barkhurst had no reason to disbelieve it.

Barkhurst had agreed to take McCallister into business if and when McCallister won his suit. McCallister from time to time allowed Barkhurst to read letters from his attorneys concerning the progress of the suit, letters allegedly written by McCallister himself.

Wednesday McCallister called Barkhurst by phone. It is alleged, and told him he had won the suit, and had received a check for \$3685.50. McCallister said his wife Mary took a check for that amount to Barkhurst.

Mrs. McCallister had the check in her possession and said she would not give it to her husband unless she was given \$2000 of it to pay a debt she said he owed her brother. So Barkhurst, advanced her \$2000 and kept the check, later found to have been printed in McMinnville, Ore., and of no value. McCallister and his wife left and have not returned.

The day he got the \$2000 from Barkhurst, McCallister drove to Seattle and made good an "N. S. F." check there for \$200. Stammers reported, Seattle authorities have been asked to aid in locating the couple, believed to be driving a light roadster bearing Oregon license plates No. 263-560.

Monmouth—Approximately 150 descendants of John, Alfred and Noah Powell and Mrs. Lucinda Powell Propst gathered at Helmick State park, four miles south of Monmouth Sunday for the 15th annual reunion of the Powell Memorial society.

The three brothers and sister crossed the plains from the middle-west in 1831 and eventually established a home settlement seven miles southeast of Albany. The parents died enroute. The brothers served as circuit riders throughout the Oregon country. All were ministers of the Christian denomination.

In time John Powell located near Monmouth and Noah Powell in Marion county. Many of the descendants of Mrs. Propst live in Linn county, which number a large group, are scattered throughout California and the northwest.

Two distinguished members, representatives of the regular U. S. army were present for the reunion Sunday. Captain Eric Lane of San Diego, who has been retired after 15 years of active army service, and who will shortly live in Eugene, and Lieutenant Herbert Powell of Georgia, son of I. C. Powell of Monmouth, who is to be stationed at Fort Douglas, Salt Lake City. Delegations attended from Portland, Salem, Scio, Lebanon, Dallas, Albany, San Francisco, Eugene, Cottage Grove, Philomath, Klamath Falls, Forest Grove, Jefferson, Stayton, Turner, Sheridan, Milwaukie and Silverton.
