EGAN DEFEATS HELLMAN WITH PAR FIGURES

Alderwood Country club, Portland, Ore., June 29 (UP)—Gigantic young Herman Hellman, Oakland city champion, Stanford graduate, and son of Marco Hellman, Los Angeles capitalist, had one of the most uncomfortable mornings of his 22 years today when he played golf with a man who was national amateur champion several years before Hellman was born.

H. Chandler Egan, after nearly 30 years of top flight golf, toured the tough Alderwood course in par figures to go seven up on Hellman at the end of the first 18 holes of their second round match in the Pacific northwest amateur golf championship.

"I never saw such shots in my life," said Hellman, who is six feet four inches tall and weighs 185 pounds. "Egan seemed to be able to do anything."

Egan shot 36-36-72; Hellman 37-39-76.

Eddie Hogan who dethroned Frank Dolp, the defending champion Tuesday, was one up on James Hunsing, Portland public links star at noon. Hogan carded 36-37-73, Hunsing 37-38-75.

Johnny Shields, Washington state champion, turned in a big round 80 and went to lunch mad as a hatter, and one down to Lelf Jacobson of Portland.

"Oh, I couldn't do anything," said one up but Hogan said. "I couldn't drive, I couldn't use my irons, I couldn't putt. Grrrrrrr."

Dr. O. F. Willing and Harry Givan of Seattle were having a nip and tuck battle and were all square at lunch. Willing's card, 36-35-71, Givan's 37-35-72. Willing was one up but Givan took the 18th with a nice 4.

Vince Dolp was one up on J. H. Crowell of Columbia. Dolp had a 75, Crowell a 78.

Jack Paulson, Alderwood, was one up on Joe Brown, Portland at the end of 18.

Johnny Robbins, Alderwood, was 3 up on Dr. Cliff Baker, the Kalama dentist. Robbins was one over par with 37-36-73 and Baker shot 39-36-75.

George Mead, member of the Portland public links team, had little trouble in leading Scotty Campbell, Seattle public links star, 7 up at the end of 18.

Salient Points In Democratic Platform

Convention Headquarters, Chicago, June 29 (UP)—Salient points of the democratic platform adopted today by the resolutions committee are as follows:

1—The prohibition plank would commit the party to repeal, wine and beer.

2—Government costs: not less than 25 per cent reduction in federal expense; zealous efforts for proportional reduction of state expenses.

3—Budget balancing by taxation on the principle of ability to pay.

4—Preservation of sound currency at all hazards and a pledge to call an international conference "to consider the rehabilitation of silver and related questions."

5—Competitive tariffs for revenue; an international conference to restore international trade and facilitate exchange and tariff commission freedom from "executive interference."

6—Federal loans to states for unemployment relief; shorter hours of labor; federal public construction in the public interest "such as flood control and waterways, including the St. Lawrence-Great Lakes project."

7—State unemployment and old age insurance.

8—Agriculture: improved credit at low rates of interest "on an amortization plan"; extension of the farm cooperative movement; effective control of surpluses; enactment of every constitutional measure "that will aid the farmer."

9—An army and navy "adequate for national defense."

10—Conservation, use and development of water power in the public interest; impartial, strict enforcement of anti-trust laws but revision for better protection of labor, small producers and distributors.

11—Protection for the investing public by requiring public reports of "true information" respecting all foreign and domestic stock and bond issues; federal regulation of stock exchanges, holding companies and utilities through an interstate business.

12—Banking: quicker liquidation of closed banks; rigid regulations against speculation with bank deposits; divorce of security affiliates from commercial banks; further precautions against leakage of federal reserve credits into speculative channels.

13—Full justice and generosity for disabled war veterans and their dependents.

14—Unqualified opposition to cancellation of debts owed the United States by foreign governments; adherence to the world court subject to reservations pending in the Senate for ratification of the Kellogg pact effective.

15—Independence for the Philippines, ultimate statehood for Porto Rico.

16—Simplified legal procedure.

17—Continued publicity of political contributions and expenditures. The platform concluded with condemnation for:

1—Excessive and improper use of money in political activities.

2—Lobbying through personal contact.

3—Actions or utterances by high officials designed to influence the stock market.

4—Administration resistance to congressional efforts toward economy.

5—Extravagance of the farm board; stabilization operations and surplus policies.

6—Excessive power by the department of state in "assuming to pass on foreign securities" offered in the United States.

7—The Smoot-Hawley tariff.

Tacoma, Wash., June 29 (UP)—More than 100 librarians from Washington, Oregon, Idaho, Montana, Utah and British Columbia will attend the 23rd annual convention of the Pacific Northwest Library association, which will be held Thursday, Friday and Saturday at Paradise Inn, Rainier national park.

The convention will be opened tomorrow morning by Miss Jacqueline Noel, librarian of the Tacoma public library, which is acting as host.

Judson T. Jennings, librarian of the Seattle public library and chairman of the Washington state committee of the northwest association, will preside.

Among those who will speak at the meetings are: Mabel E. Doty, La Grande, Ore.; Mildred Huntman, Baker, Ore.; Sabra Nasson, McMinnville, Ore.; E. Ruth Rockwood, Portland, and M. H. Douglas, Eugene, Ore.

Striking miners stage naval battle

Powhatan, Ohio, June 29 (UP)—The "first naval battle" in the protracted strike of the miners in the Ohio valley, was staged today as a result, United States marshals were reported enroute here to prevent further encounters.

Coal miners embarked on the Ohio river in an attempt to evade a picket line of 500 strikers who patrolled the mine area. In mid-stream they were met by the United States fleet. A pitched battle was staged while national guard observers and deputy sheriffs watched from the Ohio shore, unable to interfere because the encounter was on federal territory. Sticks, clubs and oars were the battle weapons.

Casualties included two men who were thrown overboard.

The war department was notified.

CAPITAL WILL DEVELOP MINE

Cordova, Alaska, June 29 (UP)—Plans were being made to bring in outside capital and develop on a large scale an immense gold-bearing quartz ledge discovered at Mile 42 on Boat mountain, by Fred Johnson and E. E. Smith, who were grubstaked by Emil Helekall of Cordova.

The ledge is said to be 1800 feet wide, 1500 feet high and of unestimated depth.

Local assays showed that more than \$3 a ton is free milling telluride and sylvanite. Ample water power is available near by and the site is only two and a half miles from the railroad by easy grade.

The discoverers staked 22 claims.

FLOODS IN CHINA

Nanking, China, June 29 (AP)—Hundreds of farmers in the valley of the Kan river have been drowned and thousands are homeless as a result of floods in the Yangtze district. Cholera is adding to the misery of the people.

HURT IN RIOTS

Bombay, June 29 (UP)—Renewal of rioting between Hindus and Moslems injured a score of persons today and brought out police reserves to quell the disorders. Serious rioting earlier this month caused about 70 deaths.

PROGRAMS FOR PLAYGROUND REARRANGED

Instruction of small boys and girls in the art of swimming was begun at the Olinger field playground this week with the addition of Esther Arnold to the personnel of the supervising force. Miss Arnold who did commendable work at the playground last year will have charge of swimming classes between the hours of 10:30 a.m. and noon Tuesdays and Saturdays, during the remainder of the season. The pool has been dredged until there is a depth of water of seven feet under the diving board. However, there is plenty of shallow water for the beginners.

Next Saturday afternoon a schedule will be drawn up for a number of baseball teams. The four teams of the Church league which functioned early in the spring will be added to the squads of Lincoln and Olinger, thus making much more competition than is ordinarily enjoyed by the playground ball players.

A croquet tournament for girls will be started just as soon as the work of placing the court in condition has been completed, while the boys are expected to compete in horseshoe pitching. A lack of horseshoes has prevented much headway in the latter sport.

Children who have performed during the council hours at 1:45 each afternoon are permitted to sing or recite on the public address system of the Cherry City Baking company truck each Friday. Four appearances before the council entitles the youngster to an emblem.

All of the equipment at Olinger field is in constant use during the day, due to the large number of children taking advantage of the playground.

The Salem branch of the organization has recently completed the furnishings for one bedroom, in which may be found many interesting things which were used in pioneer homes throughout Oregon.

CHINESE RADICALS FREE AMERICANS

Peiping, June 29 (UP)—Eight American women and children's members of missionaries' families, were safe at Shekow and Hankow today after being held captive for a day by Chinese communists.

The communists continued to hold two missionaries, Rev. D. W. Wikner and Rev. Arthur R. Nyhus. The Americans, who were seized at Kikung-shan, a summer resort, included:

Mrs. D. V. Wikner and three children, Mead, Neb., stationed at Yuchow under auspices of the Augustana synod of Minnesota.

Mrs. Eric Sivik and son, Northfield, Minn., stationed at Shekow with the Minneapolis United Lutheran mission.

Rev. and Mrs. Arthur E. Nyhus and their infant son, Fertile, Ia., connected with the Lutheran Brethren mission of Grand Forks, N. D., and stationed at Tsingtau.

Rev. H. K. W. Sandy, stationed at Wuchang under auspices of Wesleyan Methodist mission, American address unknown.

DUPREE POE HELD IN PRISON CELL

Dupree Poe, who is under indictment with Frank Manning and Robert Ripley for the murder of Officer James Iverson of Silverton was returned to Salem Tuesday night by Deputy Sheriff Sam Burkhardt and State Officer P. E. Dodel from Seattle where he was arrested Monday.

Poe was taken to a cell in the state penitentiary, the officers desiring to keep him separate from Manning and Ripley who are in the county jail.

The officers said that Poe admitted, on the trip from Seattle, that he was with Manning and Ripley on the night of the murder, but refused to go further into details.

Brown Shirt Army Granted Free Rein

Berlin, June 29 (UP)—Adolf Hitler's brown shirt army was granted free rein in Germany today in a dictatorial decree signed by President Paul von Hindenburg.

The decree broke the resistance of the southern German states to the government's recent action lifting of the ban on Hitler's militia. It ordered immediate lifting of state bans on uniforms and demonstrations, still wholly or partly enforced in Bavaria, Baden and Wurttemberg.

NAVY BILL THROUGH

Washington, June 29 (UP)—Congressional action was completed today on the \$35,000,000 navy appropriation bill when the senate adopted the conference report.

WET PLANK TO BE DEBATED THIS EVENING

Chicago, June 29 (UP)—The prohibition plan is headed for a floor fight in the democratic convention tonight with the bulk of the resolutions committee supporting a proposal to record the party as favoring repeal of the 18th amendment and immediate modification of the Volstead act.

With a surprising 35 to 17 vote, the full committee reversed the recommendation of its subcommittee and converted what had been the minority report into the one favored by the majority of the full committee.

It had just a moment before voted down the recommendation that had come to the full committee with the approval of most of the nine members of the drafting sub-group.

In the face of the sudden
