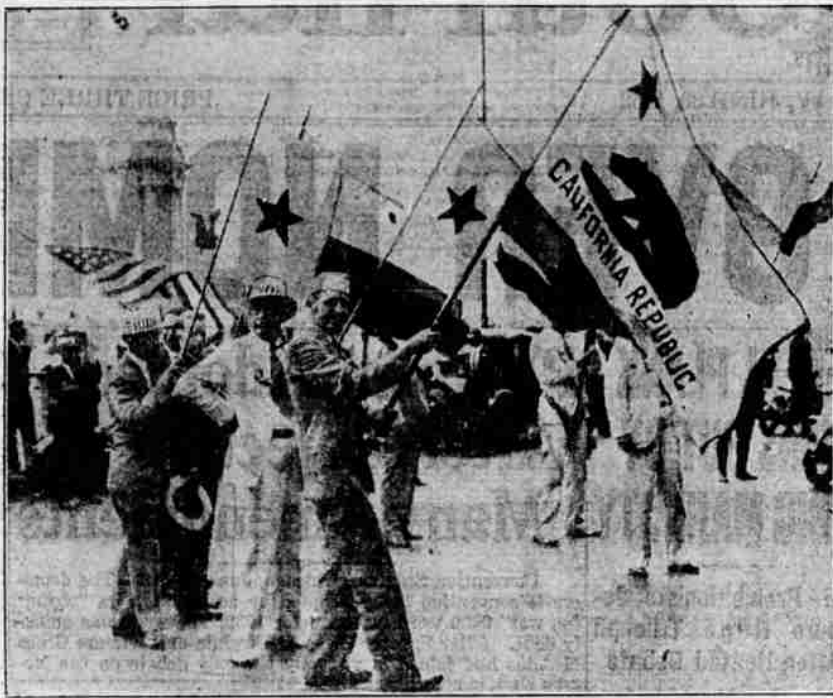
CONFERENCE IS ENDED
