

STILL SEIZED AT SILVERTON USED RECENTLY

Silverton—A 30 gallon still is now the property of the city and county authorities and from all indications, was formerly in the possession of Mr. and Mrs. Joe McCallister, reported to be guests of the city of Portland awaiting trial on swindling charges in a \$2,000 deal against a Portland resident.

The McCallister home was ordered searched by S. A. Piny, constable for the Silverton district, Wednesday. He found many evidences of the bootlegging industry suffering no depression in the way of many bottles recently used and materials for making moonshine and a fine still of 30 gallon capacity. The owners had made no effort to conceal the still but had operated it recently in a bedroom of the house. It was found under a heavy canvas. A number of large trunks were also in the bedroom, the contents of which are being saved as other evidence as is reported to be needed in connection with charges against the McCallisters. Many signed checks not filled out as to amounts were suspicious evidence found in the house.

The McCallisters are believed to have lived here for the past two years. He sold washing machines and rented floor space from the Fred Cavender radio repair shop they lived in rented property on Liberty street near the Silver Falls timber company mill and had been under no suspicion by Silverton residents until the Portland affair of last week.

Piny stated that the still appeared to be about eight years old and undoubtedly had been in very recent use. The state authorities are working with the local force and promises of other developments in the case as soon as definite action is taken by the officers in interesting Silverton people.

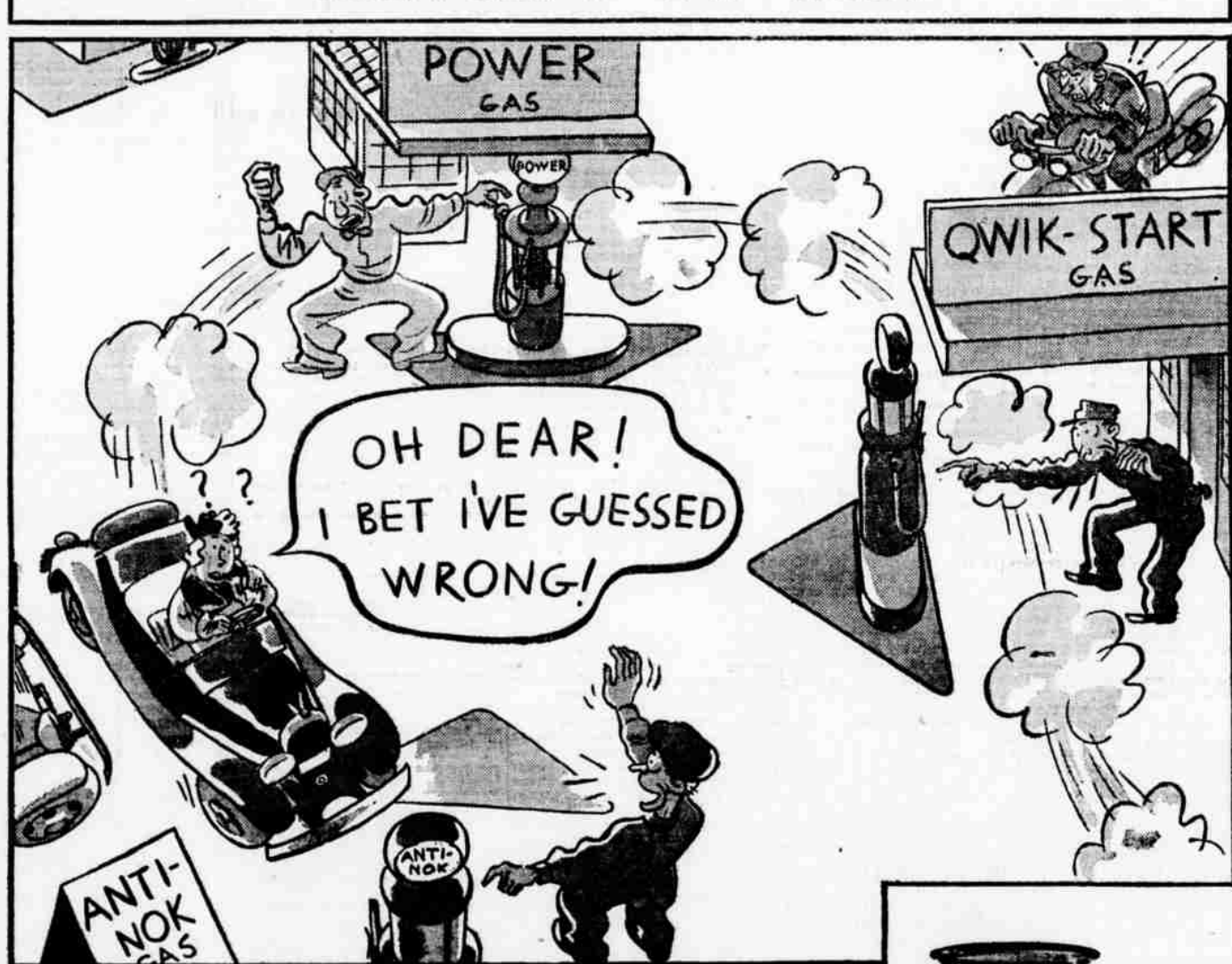
