

AMERICA'S GREATEST TRACKSTERS IN FIELD MEET

HELEN WILLS MOODY WINS WIMBLEDON TENNIS TITLE FOR 5th TIME

ATHLETES FROM MANY COLLEGES VISIT BERKELEY

Berkeley, Cal., July 1 (U.P.)—America's greatest track and field event, the I.C.A.A.A. meet, was to open at Edwards field on the University of California campus here today, with the University of Southern California a strong favorite to win its third successive championship, and its fifth in the past seven years.

Three hundred and twenty-two athletes from the biggest colleges and universities of the country were to begin with a series of heats in practically every event. At least four intercollegiate records seemed destined to fall.

Two records should be accounted for Ben Eastman, bespectacled Stanford University flash, in the opinion of Lawson Robertson, coach of the American Olympic team. They are in the 440 and 880 yard runs, in each of which Eastman has set new world marks this year.

Penrose Hallowell, Harvard, and Joe McCluskey, Fordham, were expected to break the mile and two-mile marks, respectively.

The meet takes on additional significance today. For the leading athletes will be selected to compete in the Olympic trials at Palo Alto two weeks hence.

Southern California was conceded anywhere between 40 and 50 points to win the meet, with Harvard considered a likely second, and Stanford, California and Pennsylvania fighting it out for third place.

Yale, Princeton, New York U., Cornell, Fordham, Colgate, Massachusetts, Michigan, Georgetown, Massachusetts Tech, Pittsburgh, West Virginia, Bates, Penn State and Holy Cross were in the "also ran" class.

ILLAHEE WILL CONTINUE SAYS PRESIDENT DAY

"The Illahee Country club will continue in business. JACOBS, FELLOW CALIFORNIAN IS FINALS VICTIM

Wimbledon, Eng., July 1 (U.P.)—Mrs. Helen Wills Moody today won the Wimbledon tennis championship for the fifth time, defeating Helen Jacobs, fellow Californian, in the final match 6-3, 6-1.

Mrs. Moody won the Wimbledon title first in 1927 as Helen Wills and repeated the next three years. She did not go abroad last year and the title fell to Cilly Aussem of Germany, who did not compete this year.

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Mrs. Moody winning then with the loss of only three games.

Mrs. Moody played conservative tennis and was not up to the brilliance she has shown on other occasions. She also had the match in hand and the strokes to gain the points when needed. Mostly she contented herself with getting the ball back over the net and letting Miss Jacobs make the errors.

Wilmer Allison and John Van Ryn, Wimbledon doubles champions in 1929 and 1930 and present American Davis cup pair, were defeated in the semi-finals by the veteran French combination of Jacques Brugnon and Jean Borotra, 6-3, 6-2, 6-4.

The defeat of Allison and Van Ryn, who were never ahead in their match, was a blow to British tennis critics who had labeled the Americans the world's leading tennis doubles pair.

It was a popular triumph with the galleries, however, as Borotra long has been the idol of the Wimbledon crowds. Jean is far from the form he once showed here but with the methodical Brugnon was more than a match for the younger American pair.

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
