Mrs. Garner, wife and secretary of the presidential candidate who gained 11 votes on the third ballot, said the speaker liked complete quiet after working hours and had not listened to radio broadcasts of the convention proceedings throughout the night.

Mr. Garner got up this morning at 6 o'clock as usual, ate breakfast and reached the capital just after 7. Then he read the morning papers and started on his correspondence.

Harold L. Menjou Ordered To Trial

Los Angeles, July 1 (AP)—Harold L. Menjou, 30, adopted son of Adolphe Menjou, film actor, has been ordered to trial in superior court on charges of second degree murder and drunk driving. The justice court in Inglewood yesterday held the youth for the trial after preliminary hearing.

Menjou was charged with driving an automobile at an excessive rate of speed at the time it overturned, killing his companion, 16 year old Marjorie Gauthier, to whom he was engaged to marry.

Turning his back on previous state charges that Curtis' hoax confession was true, Assistant Attorney General Joseph L. Langham, arguing against a defense motion for a directed verdict of acquittal, declared the state had proven that Curtis was in contact with the kidnapers.

Langham maintained Curtis had lied when he signed a statement in which he admitted that all his tales about negotiations with the kidnapers had been false.

CURTIS LIED TO SAVE SKIN ASSERTS STATE

Flamington, N. J., July 1 (AP)—The state of New Jersey reversed itself today and charged that John Hughes Curtis, confessed Lindbergh hoaxer, had actually been in contact with the kidnapers of Charles A. Lindbergh, Jr., but had been brought to deny it because he was afraid of gangsters and feared for his life.

Turning his back on previous state charges that Curtis' hoax confession was true, Assistant Attorney General Joseph L. Langham, arguing against a defense motion for a directed verdict of acquittal, declared the state had proven that Curtis was in contact with the kidnapers.

"Curtis could not have identified the kidnaper if he did not know him," he declared. "If you ask me what the motive was I'll tell you the compelling motive might have been fear. Curtis might have wanted to save his own skin. He didn't dare tell Lindbergh the true facts because he feared for his life."

Langham maintained Curtis had lied when he signed a statement in which he admitted that all his tales about negotiations with the kidnapers had been false.

"He lied to save his own skin; he was afraid of gangsters," he said.

The motion was denied and the defense summoned Col. H. Norman Schwarzkopf, head of the state police and in charge of the investigation into the kidnapping, as its first witness.
