

NOISY PARTIES LURE RAIDERS AT SILVERTON

Silverton—For a number of months the residents of several communities adjacent to Silverton and of certain sections of the town have entered complaints to those in authority concerning parties that were of too long duration and too "noisy." State, county and city officers have been trying to place the cause of the center of distribution and Saturday evening at about 9 o'clock a raid was made on the home of William Robbins of 418 McClain street.

A party was in progress at the time eight officers entered the home and placed Robbins, Elmer Dick, and H. F. Roth under arrest, allowing a number of other men to leave, being held only as witnesses. The men will stand trial Tuesday afternoon in justice court under supervision of Judge P. L. Brown.

Two full cases of beer and two gallons of rum presumably of beer were confiscated and are being held as evidence.

Officers active in the arrests were State Officers Lanning, Clayton Houston, City police included Chief Dahl, Kennedy, Powell and Hannan. Constable S. A. Pitney and Mayor L. C. Eastman were also instrumental in locating the group.

The quality of the contents of one of the earthen jugs was of sufficient force to "shoot" the pocket knife of one of the officers to the ceiling of the city hall when, in lieu of a cork screw, he attempted to remove the cork that was tied in the jug with heavy strings, and inserted the knife in the cork to remove it. The blue smoke and foam continued to escape for several seconds.

This is the second capture of wet goods within as many days at Silverton, the other being a 30 gallon still taken from a McCallister residence on East Hill.

BOND ISSUED VOTED STAYTON ELECTION

Stayton—A special city election for the purpose of voting on the issuance of refunding bonds was held in Stayton on Thursday. The total vote was very small, but the issue carried by a large majority, only three opposing votes being cast. As a result of the vote the council is authorized to issue approximately \$16,000 of bonds to refund the street improvement bonds which will be due in October of this year and about \$4,000 to fund certain water plant indebtedness.

The town has a water plant producing plenty of pure water and a system has been put on a paying basis.

TWO SILVERTON CHILDREN HURT BY AUTOMOBILES

Silverton—Charles, the 4-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. V. L. Larson of 1011 South Water street, was critically injured by a hit-and-run driver near the family home early Friday evening while the child was riding his tricycle on the main Silver Falls highway.

A number of other children were with him at the time he was struck. Charles suffered a badly broken collar bone and his body was completely covered with bruises. He was unconscious for several minutes after the accident. One side of his face was lacerated in the forehead over his left eye. From all appearances the child did not pass over the child's body but knocked him and his tricycle across the wide street. His tricycle was completely demolished.

The driver of the car was alone and those who witnessed the accident described the automobile as an old Ford touring car. He drove as fast as the car could seemingly go, so it is reported, toward the Silverton Hills district and was seen in that community exceeding the speed limit.

Mrs. Larson's brother, Edward King, was killed four years ago on the Fourth of July in an automobile collision and the same year in less than a month his sister, Clara King, was killed by falling from a logging train which was coming from camp No. 16 of the Silver Falls Timber company. The real extent of the injuries of the boy cannot yet be determined but so far no bones are thought to be broken excepting the collar bone.

The Hipple and Eskridge partnership was formed in 1913 after the fire which destroyed the larger part of Sheridan's business houses, in the number being the Hipple and Drummer hardware store, which had been in existence for a period of six years.

Mr. Hipple has been seriously ill for some time and this fact has brought about the dissolving of the partnership and his retirement from business. Mr. Eskridge, the junior member of the firm, has given his attention to his large orchard on the Skyline and for that reason Mr. Hipple has been left with the entire management of the business. Mr. Hipple will make a complete rest, still retaining his home in Sheridan.

Mr. Kaufman will move his stock from Fall City unless it is sold within a short time. Of the business' firms existing previous to the 1913 fire only two remain now: William Demore, jewelry and Victor Gross, harness shop.
