

PARTY HOLDERS APPEAR BEFORE JUSTICE BROWN

Silverton—A number of cases were before Judge P. L. Brown for decision or continuance at 2 o'clock Tuesday afternoon with no fines being imposed, and two men to await further proceedings Wednesday.

Elmer Dick was cleared by Judge Brown with a severe warning that the next time he should not be so generously dealt with. Dick was one of a party of seven that was apprehended by state and county officers on enjoying a noisy party Saturday evening at the home of William Robbins on McClain street. Dick admitted to the judge that this wasn't the first appearance in court on various charges and he promised that he would do his best to make it his last. The complaint was sworn to by a state officer who was one of the witnesses of the confiscation of two cases of beer and two gallon jugs of other intoxicants from the Robbins home, with the charge that he had inhibited two men.

H. F. Roth, who shouldered his share of the blame for the party, was the only one of the group to remain as a guest of the city in lieu of a few dollars for bail. Robbins put up his bond and appeared promptly for his conference with the judge. Both men expressed no desire for an attorney, and pleaded guilty of having home brew in their possession. They denied stoutly that they had ever sold any, but admitted having given it to friends, though officers believed some suspicious looking containers were removed from the house on different occasions. Judge Brown refused to pass sentence on either Robbins or Roth until after he had time to consider the case further.

A brother of Clifford Emerson, Roy Emerson, paid the costs, \$3.00, and guaranteed the return of a gun that Clifford was alleged to have borrowed from Lewis McEwen and sold to Max Crowder of The Dalles. The gun was a 32-40 Marlin, and had been loaned by McEwen to Emerson in good faith. McEwen had known for some time who had been in possession of his property and had waited for several months for the promised return, but found court action the only way to hurry matters along. Ernest Crowder, brother of the buyer of the gun, assured McEwen that he would drive to The Dalles Sunday and return the gun. Emerson was freed on the strength of the promise.

Constable S. A. Pitney served papers on Henry Hertel for operating an auto vehicle without a license. No fine was imposed but a minimum cost of \$3 was asked. Hertel's attorney argued that the offense was the result of Hertel merely taking his automobile to get it weighed for the proper requirements to obtain a license, and that the run up East hill where he was sighted by Pitney was a mere jaunt to see his "girl," that the intention was anything but criminal, and that there had been a financial depression with them both, also the license had been applied for, and asked a lessening of ever the costs imposed. The result was that the judge released and let the young man off with one dollar costs.

POLICE SEEKING YOUNG MEXICAN; VICTIM IS DEAD

Albany—Linn county officials were still in a quandry Tuesday evening as to the whereabouts of Gerardo Perez, 29, Mexican, who fatally shot Gerardo Martinez, 28, another Mexican section hand, Monday night. Martinez died early Tuesday at the Albany General hospital.

Details of the crime were meager yesterday, but the theory is that the altercation which led to the shooting was over a woman of the Albany Mexican colony of which Martinez was a member. Perez was stationed at Tangent.

Martinez, before his death stated he was called to the door of his home by Perez, who had left a bundle there and after a few angry words Perez shot him. Jesus Alvarado, and Treva Salazar, who are alleged to have been with Martinez' assailant, disclaim any knowledge of the affair. Both are being held by the officers for investigation.

Gowen E. C. Fisher, announced no inquest would be held until Perez has been found.

The bullet which proved fatal to Martinez was fired by either a .32 or .38 revolver, attending physicians believe. It entered the victim's body just above the collar bone on the right side of his chest and penetrated to the right shoulder. The bullet lodged under the skin and was extracted.

Neighbors living near the scene called a physician, who in turn called the sheriff.

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Water Rate Reduction Asked By Petitioners Of Silverton Council

Silverton—A petition, within itself a protest of 715 citizens, with Attorney F. E. Sylvester a mediator of presentation was of prime importance at the regular monthly meeting of the Silverton city council Tuesday evening.

The change in water rates offered the subject for consideration. Among actions of the forum was the refunding of dance license to the congregation of the St. Paul's Catholic congregation since the money from the affair was used to rebuild the new hall used for entertainment of the young people of the group and considered by the council members as sufficiently charitable cause to warrant the refunding of the fees. A continuance of the question of removing a pier at the new bridge site, left in the hands of the street committee at the June meeting was asked by the committee. The regular reports of the city librarian and operators of the police car were approved.

City ordinance No. 250 with reference to wholesale vehicle tax has been in the hands of a special committee for consideration of repeal since last council meeting. Discussions seemed to favor definite action on a discontinuance of the ordinance as a part of the city laws, however, the final decision will not be determined till the August session.

Concerning a request of Dr. A. F. Blackberry to raise a wooden sidewalk in front of his dental office to the level of the adjoining walks without replacing the walk with a cement structure was disposed of in the following acceding motion which passed unanimously: Since the building stands several feet off the ground at the sidewalk junction rendering cement too expensive at the present time, the affair be placed in the hands of the street committee with power to act in allowing Dr. Blackberry to raise the present sidewalk to the level of the adjoining walks. The walk in front of the Verrier property was reported on as indicating that the owners were now willing to assume the responsibility of building of the walk. This topic has been favorably and unfavorably reported upon from the owners for several months. Indications now seem to be for a new walk by the owners.

A number of citizens in attendance interested in the action of the council concerning the protest petition defended for the signers through the efforts of Attorney Sylvester. The petition reads: "To the Honorable Mayor and councilmen and water commission of the city of Silverton.

"We the undersigned resident patrons and users of water furnished by the city of Silverton, do hereby protest against the rates now being charged for water used by the patrons of the city of Silverton.

"The people of Silverton wish to help beautify the city by the use of water on the lawns.

"There is an abundance of water now going to waste and doing no one any good.

"Therefore, we, the citizens and patrons of the city of Silverton, respectfully ask that immediate action be taken to readjust the rates before the season for watering lawns has passed. We believe that these rates should be adjusted so that patrons secure something for the \$1 minimum now being charged."

In direct reply to the presentation of the petition by Attorney Sylvester, Mayor L. O. Eastman explained that the city council had no authority over the actions of the water commission, but that the commission had been reasonable, in compliance with the wishes of citizens in general, and as the petition was directed to the mayor and councilmen as well as the commission, he would, with the approval of the forum members appoint a committee of reliable citizens not connected with the council or with the water commission, to wait upon the numbers and act with the commission in regards to the expressed desires of the people.
