

## PORTLAND TAKES POSSESSION OF FIRST POSITION

The Hollywood Stars found themselves in second place in the Coast league today after taking an 8 to 3 pasting last night from the Mission Reds, cellar champions of the circuit. The Reds are only six games behind Seattle, leader of the second division. The Portland Beavers took sole possession of first place defeating Sacramento 7 to 5 in the series opener.

The Senators, who have played only three games at home in the last six weeks, returned to Moreland field last night, fresh from some impressive victories over Hollywood. The victory broke the Beavers' tie for the league lead. The Stars outbatted Koupal, Prudhomme and Palmisano; Sacramento, Bryan and Wirtz.

The Missions wasted no time in clinching victory, making four runs in the first and two in the second inning. T. Pillette held the Star hitters to seven safeties, and the home team's only threat came in the second inning when Brannan hit a home run with one man on base. The Missions sluggers took 12 hits from Emil Yde. The Stars added their downfall by making three errors. Batteries: Hollywood, Yde and Basler; Missions, T. Pillette and Ricci.

The Los Angeles Angels beat San Francisco 4 to 1 by tying the score at one-all in the second inning and pushing over a run in the sixth and two more in the ninth. The Angels' only run was made by August Galan in the first inning when he tripled and scored on another triple by Ernie Sulik. Hubbard—Word was received here by the George Washington Bicentennial committee that July 26 has been set as postoffice day. ## Olympic Finance Board Makes Drastic Cuts In Personnel Of Squads

New York, July 6 (U.P.)—Only \$48,000 more is needed to insure America's complete representation by its squad of 340 athletes at the international games in Los Angeles, according to the American Olympic finance committee.

This heartening announcement was made at the committee's final meeting. Treasurer George W. Graves almost despaired of attaining the necessary amount.

It had been estimated originally that \$350,000 would be necessary to provide for complete representation. But the committee instituted a drastic economy campaign which cut down this quite considerably. The committee set the final limits on every team in every sport, limiting the total of United States contestants to 340. This is much smaller than the representations of former years. Some 400 athletes were sent to Amsterdam in 1928.

Chairman of several sports committees assured the finance organization that they would assume full responsibility for the expenses of their teams. In this category were yachting, lacrosse, rifle shooting and modern pentathlon.

The limits placed on each sport follow:

Track and field men—67 competitors, manager, assistant manager and coach. Wrestling—14 competitors, manager and coach. Field hockey—17 competitors, playing manager and coach.

Revolving shooting—3 competitors, (no transportation to be paid). Fencing—18 men and 3 women, manager and two coaches.

Track and field, women—18 competitors, manager, coach, chaperone. Cycling—8 competitors, manager. (No transportation to be paid). Gymnastics—22 competitors, manager and coach.

Swimming—17 men, 20 women, 11 water polo players, manager, assistant manager for men, assistant manager for women, swimming coach for men, swimming coach for women, diving coach for women and water polo coach.

Rowing—32 competitors, manager, assistant manager, two coaches. Weight-lifting—10 competitors, manager and coach.

Equestrian—9 competitors (only traveling expenses required). Yachting—14 competitors (no expenses to be paid).

Rifle shooting—3 competitors. (No expenses to be paid). Modern pentathlon—3 competitors. (No expenses to be paid). Lacrosse—25 competitors, manager and coach. (No expenses to be paid).

## Complaint Is Filed Against Andersons

Dallas—A complaint has been filed in circuit court by F. O. Beyerley against A. G. Anderson and Fairy L. Anderson, his wife, in which the plaintiff states that the defendants signed a promissory note December 17, 1927, for \$2000, with interest at 7 per cent, securing same with a mortgage on real property. The complaint further states that no part of the principal or interest has been paid since 1929 and asks that the mortgage be declared a valid first lien and that the property sold in the manner as prescribed by law in order to satisfy the plaintiff's judgment, pay the costs of the sheriff's sale, pay the attorney's fees and the costs and disbursements of the suit.
