

WANTED SLAYER SURRENDERS TO LINN OFFICERS

Albany—Gregorio Perez, slayer of Gerardo Martinez following an altercation the night of July 4, surrendered himself to the Linn county sheriff early yesterday morning. State, county and railroad officers were examining Nives Parra Alvarado and Jesus Salazar, who had been arrested shortly after the shooting and were held for investigation.

Perez alleges he had spent the time that elapsed since the crime hiding in the brush in Hackleman's grove.

In a signed statement Perez confessed to the shooting of Martinez and pleaded self defense in justification of the act.

Officers believe the feud between Perez and the dead man developed when Consuelo Cacho, comely inhabitant of the local Mexican colony forbade Perez, with whom she had been keeping company, to come to her home. She then became the sweetheart of Martinez. The girl said she had kept company with Perez several years ago.

Perez has been headquartered at Tangent, and a member of the section crew.

Officers have failed to find the gun which Perez is alleged to have shot Martinez with. Perez stated he threw it away after he and Martinez had quarreled and Perez had fired the shot in self defense, when Martinez allegedly pulled a gun and a knife on Perez.

ATTEMPT TO ENTER STORE IS REPORTED

Independence—An attempt was made to enter the Penny Co. Store on Main street Saturday night or early Sunday morning, by breaking through the skylight on the roof. A ladder was used by the would-be robbers to gain access to the roof of the building, presumably by way of the Creamery and Masonic buildings.

The broken glass was the first clue found by the manager of the store on Sunday morning, and footprints and fingerprints were afterwards found on the roof and skylight of the building. It is almost certain that nothing was molested in the store as no trade could be found where anyone was actually inside the building, and in all probability were scared away by the falling glass, or noise on the streets of approaching auto.

Suspicious characters were seen in the store Saturday making small purchases. Finger-print experts were called to take the prints.

ORDINANCE HAS COUNCIL ACTION AT MT. ANGEL

Mt. Angel—A regular meeting of the city council was held Tuesday evening in the city hall. All the members of the council were present. The meeting was called to order by Mayor Webb.

The communications from C. E. Ross, Portland General Electric company, and communications on assessment and taxation of municipal utilities were read. The mayor appointed the finance committee to make an appraisal of the water plant.

Mr. Bally was present and asked that title extensions be placed from the title across Main street near his property. He agreed to cover this title at no expense to the city. The street committee was given power to act in this matter.

The communication from Attorney C. E. Ross was then taken up regarding protection to the fire department. Mr. Young submitted rates for protection to the fire company under a private insurance company. It was moved and seconded that Recorder Smith be authorized to go to Salem to confer with the state industrial accident commission and the motion was carried.

Councilman Hanning of the street committee reported that he had the dump grounds cleaned up, and asked that a sign be placed at the splash tank. Councilman Schwab, chairman of the water committee reported that he had made several efforts to get prices and information regarding motor for the water pump, but had not met with much success.

It was moved, seconded and carried that the bills which were submitted and approved by the finance committee have warrants issued for them.

The mayor then introduced and read a bill for an ordinance prescribing the rates to be charged and payment for the use and supply of city water. Repeating ordinance numbers 188 and 196 and all parts of ordinances in conflict herewith and declaring an emergency. This was declared to be the first reading. After the second and third reading, the mayor ordered that the above bill for an ordinance be placed upon its final passage by roll call, resulting in unanimous vote, and ordered that it be given permanent number 204.

COLONY RANCH IRRIGATION IS GREAT SUCCESS

Dallas—The Colony farm near Eola, operated for the state hospital, produces vegetables by the hundred tons. They have found that irrigation is of great assistance in increasing their tonnage. For some time they have irrigated by flooding and now plans are underway for a sprinkler system on certain types of vegetables.

Nearly 150 acres are planted to potatoes and vegetables for this state institution. During the past few days the potatoes have been receiving their first irrigation by flooding. Flooding has been too severe for the smaller vegetables and Earl Tild, farm manager, became interested in the sprinkler systems.

A few days ago a special trip was made by officials of the state hospital and the county agent to Eugene where the different types of sprinkler systems were studied.

As a result of this trip it is hoped to put in a sprinkler system for an acreage yet this season. Under the sprinkler system of irrigation not nearly so large a flow of water is required. From 50 to 100 gallons a minute will take care of quite an area. This will be the first sprinkler system in the county according to Mr. Beck, and if it works well can be applied to many farms where the present water supply is not adequate for flooding.
